the days of the wooden ship Halifax
a particularly picturesque port. The
front fronted with the masts of
ships, West India and coast traders,
at once a seaport and a ship repair
center for many of the little boats
and the tidal rivers of the Bay of
Fundy, the finest vessels in the world
built by skilled craftsmen and sent
to Halifax. The New England
commanded the trade of the
provinces, and Boston was to Halifax
as Liverpool is to Montreal. Added to
this was a large body of the West
Indies, which continues to this day. Hal-
ifax was also an imperial military port,
the base of the Atlantic squadron,
enclosed around with redoubts, and
the Union Jack flew from the masthead
of a man-of-war at the docks. Hal-
ifax has been since 1788 an important
naval station. Twenty years ago
the Blackships both disappeared from
the scene. In 1905, when the dominion took
over the harbor, the admiralty under-
took the construction of the harbor
works, and placed Canadian troops in the
area. The construction of Halifax has
however, very closely identified with
military or naval situation. The pres-
ence of the ironclads and the soldiers was
in a local way, but one line is
undoubtedly more to a port than
half a dozen naval units. Thus Hal-
ifax has larger maritime interests than
any other port in the world.

On the west side of the harbor are
seen wharves, apart from nine piers
used by the government railways, and
which steamers of the largest type may
accommodate. There are, in addi-
tion, twenty-two smaller docks, and upon
these landing places commodious docks
for the Intercolonial piers, which is
located greatly to increase their capacity.
Two of these wharves, each of
about 900 feet in length, Dock No. 2
being constructed of reinforced con-
crete, and it is claimed, will have, when
completed, the most elaborate and com-
pact provisions for handling cargo to be
on the Atlantic seaboard. This pier
will cost upwards of \$1,250,000. The
water in the harbor has a depth of from
eighteen to twenty feet, and the
harbor is never experienced with ice. The
people of Halifax are very enthusiastic
about the natural advantages of their har-
bor, and confidently expect that it will
be surpassed only by those at Sydney, New
South Wales.
