BIG FELT PLANT FOR HAMILTON

Will Employ 500 Hands and Expend \$1,000,000.

It is an English Concern. The Hamilton Spectator of yesterday said: "One of the most important industrial acquisitions of recent years was announced by C.W. Kirkpatrick, commissioner of industries, this morning. Porritts & Spencer, Bur, England, the largest manufacturers of commercial felt in the old land, have decided upon Hamilton as Canadian and export headquarters. Felt is manufactured by the company are used largely for clothing paper-making machines and the directors of this mammoth company appreciating that Canada is the greatest pulp country in the world, looks for it to become the greatest paper manufacturing country. The name of the new company has not yet been decided upon. It will probably be the Canadian Porritts-Spencer company."

As an intimation of the magnitude of the new company, it will be incorporated at not less than \$1,000,000, and immediate expenditures on construction and equipment will be from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000.

Representatives of the big English concern who have been in the city for several days and in conference with Commissioner Kirkpatrick have purchased the property on Lotridge street owned by the Canada Machinery corporation formerly the London Machine Tool company.

This embraces seven and a half acres and is considered the finest industrial site in Hamilton. The property commanded a high price and its sale was a cash transaction, another evidence of the solidarity of the English company. The site is bounded on the north by the main line of the Grand Trunk railway, on the south by the T.H. & B. industrial spur, and on Lotridge street, it has a frontage of 550 feet and a depth of 675 feet.

Hamilton plucked this new industry right from underneath the noses of Toronto, Montreal and other Canadian cities because it had the facilities the English company was looking for a live-wire industrial commissioner who "camped on the job" until negotiations were completed.

Several years ago Mr. Porritts president of the company came to Canada in search of a site for a Canadian branch. He returned to the old land without having heard of Hamilton. Two months ago William Spencer managing director, visited Canada having Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, and Vancouver in mind as possible locations. Hamilton was not being given consideration, and it was not until Commissioner Kirkpatrick was informed by J.A. Henderson of Bickle & Greening, local representatives of the Porritts-Spencer company that the company was on the lookout for an industrial location that Hamilton's advantages were brought to the attention of Mr. Spencer. The vice-president came to Hamilton and for two days Commissioner Kirkpatrick was with him, driving home the advantages of this industrial center. So impressed was Mr. Spencer with conditions here, it already being the center of the textile industry that he decided to seek no further. Returning to England Mr. Spencer prevailed upon the board of directors to locate in Hamilton, but difficulties were encountered in getting money out of England, because of the prevailing embargo. This obstacle was removed however when, a week ago, Lloyd George announced that preference under the colonies. John K. Spencer was the American representative, was enabled to close the property deal and make all necessary arrangements for the coming of the mammoth industry. The property deal was consummated yesterday.

William Spencer, vice-president will return to Hamilton in about five week's time. He will bring his family with him and make Hamilton his permanent home. The intention is to erect an administration building 80 feet by 75 feet, four story in height and a factory building 100 feet in width and 1000 feet in length. It will be of saw-tooth roof construction and as a hint of its magnitude if stretched out the length of the factory building would be more than three city blocks.

Besides manufacturing felt, the company will engage in the manufacture of woolen blankets and possibly other heavy woollens. At the start 500 hands will be employed. It will be necessary to bring out several experts to train the employees, but as far as possible the help required will be secured right here in Hamilton.

Besides being the Canadian headquarters, it is the intention to use the Hamilton plant for the handling of the export trade. The company does an extensive export business care of the Hamilton plant.

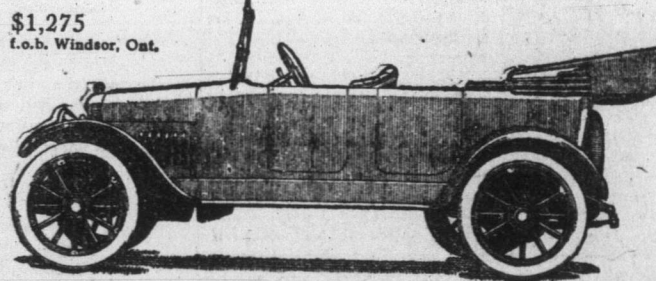
