"Sunny Ways" has crossed the Great Divide. The greatest French-Canadian and the most successful of ers and statesmen is no mo

Since 1871, when the brilliant young lawyer entered the Quebec legislature he has gone far and played an important role in the Dominion's affairs. From a humble barrister's table to the desk of Canada's prime minister is a great rise. Forty-seven years in the public's service is a long period to hold public support.

In commenting on his public record, or that of any other statesmen who has attained to leadership, even an opponent will admit that he must have possessed unusual qualities of mind and heart to reach the pinnacle and retain confidence of so large a proportion of the electorate.

Sir Wilfrid by personal magnetism, his astuteness, conciliatory nature and his silver tongue, won and held the esteem of his followers and a host of independent

He was progressive. This will largely account for the period of growth which marked the fifteen-year period he was premier of Canada. In 1896, the Dominion had scarcely recovered from the world panic of 1893. Appealing to the people on a platform of free trade, he was not long in office before he became convinced that to remove the tariff would seriously injure the young industries of the country and necessitate the introduction of direct taxation, in order to provide the necessary revenue.

Contrary to general expectation he used a pruning hook instead of a broad axe. Of the old Manchester school of statesmen, Sir Richard Cartwright may be said to have been the only out-and-out free trader included in his cabinet and Cartwright was placed where he could

Prior to 1896, the antipathy between Protectionists and Free Traders ran strong. His supporters were satisfied when he sandpapered a number of items in the tariff. His opponents pleased that the industries were not deprived of their protection. As a consequence, there was more cohesion among the Canadian people than had been witnessed since Confederation. They were in fact, if not admittedly, pulling together in one direction.

To properly estimate the success of his conciliatory methods, it should be recalled that there was in 1896 nearly as much bitterness of spirit existing between Protectionists and Free Traders as there was in 1917 between those who advocated conscription and those who favored voluntary enlistment.

While a large number of his former followers disagreed with his stand on how best to conduct Canada's efforts in the war, future historians may conclude that he be lieved, that had he been in power he could have raised the ary quota by appeals to reason. That he took the stand that he did may have been due to his conciliatory,

His book of life is closed. However much a majority of his contemporaries have recently disagreed with him on a burning question, they will admit he possessed great talents, that he creditably filled the premier's chai and morally was above reproach.
