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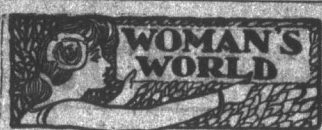

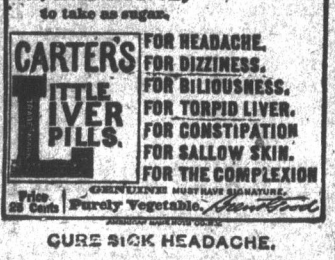

FINE CUT FACTS.

Little Paragraphs, Written in Spicy Style, That Supplement the News of the Day.

A movement is spreading through Wales for the recognition of St. David's Day as a public holiday.

There are more railway tunnels, viaducts and railroad bridges in Switzerland than in any other country in the Old World.

There are nine crematoriums in Great Britain, and during the last twenty years there have been 4,450 cremations.

Russian railways are the most dangerous in the world. Thirty persons in every million passengers are either killed or hurt.

The Shah of Persia has placed an order for six high-class automobiles in Paris. The value of this order is said to be \$23,800.

Drought in the Hawaiian Islands is causing serious loss to the sugar planters, in some districts water for household purposes is being sold by the gallon.

Russian papers state that the Chinese court astronomer predicts that the present year will last 33 years, and that four years hence Great Britain will be involved.

Methodist Progress.
At the Toronto Methodist Conference at Barrie the other day, statistics reported disclosed a total membership of 49,937, an increase of 2,979 over last year. Missionary subscriptions amounted to \$61,367, an increase of \$5,547; superannuation fund, \$12,598, an increase of \$493; educational fund, \$44,797, an increase of \$491; contingent fund, \$934, an increase of \$31; General Conference, \$2,105, an increase of \$130; union-church relief, \$644, a decrease of \$55; Sunday school aid, \$533, an increase of \$41; annuitant fund, \$2,130, an increase of \$404; temperance \$551; a decrease of \$62; Women's Missionary Society, \$14,151, an increase of \$4,932; General Epworth League, \$275, a decrease of \$33. Total amount raised for connections, \$100,632; a net increase of nearly \$10,000. Total amount raised for all purposes, \$341,882, a net increase of \$18,223. There are 289 Young People's Societies, an increase of nine, which raised \$16,842, an increase of \$2,123; Sunday schools raised for all purposes \$35,398.

Baby's Finger Prints.
The possibilities in finger print identification recently led to a curious question being put to Dr. Francis Galton, the great finger print expert, by the police authorities of a foreign state.

They had received information, they said, that a baby who was heir to a great title and estate was in danger of being kidnapped and held to ransom. Supposing this should happen and the baby eventually be restored, would finger prints taken before the abduction be sufficient to identify the baby and prove that he was not a changeling?

Dr. Galton's answer was that it is exceedingly difficult to find from the fingers of young infants. From about six years of age and upward, however, there is no difficulty, and the prints would be sufficient for identification purposes.—London Express.

Descendants of Cromwell.
Old Lord Norton, who died the other day at the age of 99, and whom the late Mrs. Gladstone was wont to describe as "the kindest of all dear William's enemies (political, of course), was one of the many descendants of Oliver Cromwell. His wife, being a Miss Hartopp and a descendant of the Earl John Hartopp who married a granddaughter of the lord protector. There are at least a thousand prominent people who can establish their descent from Cromwell and who are proud to do so. Among them are the Marquis of Ripon; Lord Chichester, Clarendon, Rosslyn, Cowper, Devon, Morley, Lytton, Walsingham, Amphil, the Countess of Derby, as well as the late Lady Lathom, the Earl of Darnley, Lord Aylesbury, and last, but not least, the late Charles Stewart Parnell, the great Irish leader.

The Earl of Darnley.
The Earl of Darnley has been elected a representative peer for Ireland, in the place of the late Viscount Hawarden, who had, however, been a peer of the United Kingdom from 1836, with the title of the Earl de Montalt, until his death last January, says The London Star. Lord Darnley is the eighth son of Lord Darnley, who was born in 1805, and is his youngest peeress.

Quebec's Enormous Birth Rate.
Dr. Osier says you can't diminish the birth rate of Quebec. In the year 1890 the late Hon. H. McCreedy, then Prime Minister of the Province, had a law passed by the Provincial Legislature granting 100 acres of the public lands to each father and mother of twelve living children, and last year a return was made to the House of those who had taken advantage of the act. This return shows that there were more than 3,400 families of twelve living children in the Province, while some were boasted of seventeen, eighteen, nineteen, and one even ran up to twenty-three. According to the last report of the Provincial Compiler of vital statistics—that is to say, for 1903—60,418 births were registered, which gives a birth rate of 38.75 per 1,000 of the population.

Counted Out.
An English paper tells a story of life in Whitechapel. A man met a friend outside a public house. "These men in here," he exclaimed, pointing behind him, "have gone and insulted me. Now, just watch me go in and kick them all into the street, one after another. You can count 'em off as they come through the door." The friend stood and watched. Presently a human form whizzed by him. "One!" he called. "Stop counting!" said the other. "It's me!"

To Follow the Ducks.
St. Petersburg, June 24.—A letter from the Caucasus says the Molokans have prepared to follow the example of the Doukhobors and are beginning to emigrate to Canada in order to escape official oppression. Count Tolstoy has been largely instrumental in inducing the Doukhobors to go to Canada.

BRITAIN ALWAYS LOSES.
Results So Far Have Not Favored the Method of Arbitration—Some of the Cases Decided.

The experience of Great Britain in the Arbitration Courts of International disputes has not, in the past, proved satisfactory. That war is a barbarous method of settling disputes between nations few will deny, and these few will not number amongst them either those who have experienced its realities, or are cognizant of the subsequent misery it carries in its train. We deplore the advent of war, and in the great cause of Christianity and civilization we are ready to record our votes for the arbitrating principle as a means of settling disputes between nations, but we cannot ignore the results which have accrued to ourselves from the awards of arbiters in the past.

In the year 1822 a difference of opinion arose between Great Britain and the United States as to the interpretation to be placed upon certain clauses in the Treaty of Ghent, signed in the year 1814. The arbitrator was the then reigning Emperor of Russia, and his award was in favor of the United States. In 1863 a dispute arose between Great Britain and Brazil over the question of compensation claimed by the former for the unwarrantable seizure of the persons of three officers belonging to her late Majesty's ship Fort. The arbitrator was then the King of Belgium, and his decision was in favor of Brazil. Within six years of the last mentioned case—in 1869—a dispute arose between Great Britain and Portugal as to their priority of claim to the West coast of Africa. The arbitrator upon was the President of the United States, Ulysses S. Grant, and his award handed the possession of the island over to Portugal.

One year later—in 1870—Great Britain claimed compensation from the Argentine Republic on behalf of certain of her subjects who had suffered loss during the war between the latter and the Republic of Uruguay. The Argentine Republic denied any liability, and it was mutually agreed to submit the question to the decision of the President of the Chilean Republic, Jose Joaquin Perez. He gave his award in favor of Argentina.

In the year 1871, during the war between the Federal and Confederate States of America, the cruiser "Alabama" was built and fitted out in England, and allowed to proceed on her course of destruction upon Federal commerce, notwithstanding representations made by the Federal Government to her true character and purpose. This constituted a breach of neutrality, which Great Britain did not deny, and the amount of compensation was left to the decision of a tribunal composed of a representative of Italy, Brazil, Great Britain, and the United States. The award, from which the British representative alone dissented as excessive, was that Great Britain was condemned to pay the enormous sum of \$2,300,000 sterling, and what is infinitely to her credit, she paid it without undue delay.

In the year 1875 Great Britain and Portugal both claimed possession of Delagoa Bay and the adjoining territory. It was agreed to leave the settlement of the question of ownership to the decision of the late Marquis MacMahon, at that time the President of the French Republic, who issued his award in favor of Portugal. Without going back a quarter of a century and questioning the rectitude of the arbiters' decision, recent events in South Africa may bring home to all of us the far-reaching consequences of this award. Had the arbiters' award been in favor of ourselves, who can say that the historian would have had to record the dispersion of a race, the squandering of millions of money upon war and warlike preparations, and the deaths of thousands of brave men.

Britain's effort in the cause of peace—efforts which may be justly termed sacrifices—are forgotten or ignored, while the loss so much to evidence at The Hague Conference entered on a war which her dignitary rendered inevitable.
