and useful piece of work, in enabling us to know our own time by events which preceded it and helped to determine its character; for to a nation, as to a community, the consciousness of its past gives the sense of continuity, which is the principle of its collective life and the nurse of its patriotism. Kingston is especially rich in historical inoident. Her history is now for the first time presented as a connected whole, and her story illustrates the growth and development of the whole of old Upper Canada. Miss Machar as a local chronicler is a pioneer in the much needed service of providing the materials for the complete story of Canadian history.

A recent volume of the Forward Mission Study Course of the Young People's Missionary Movement is The Frontier, a study of the new West by Ward Platt (292 pages, maps and illustrations, cloth 50c., paper 35c.). It is a volume specially prepared for the United States, but is worth reading on this side of the line, for many of our problems are the same as those of our neighbors to the south.

The church a missionary society; every church member a member of that society; the missionary obligation imperative,—in Thomas Cary Johnson's, Introduction to Christian Missions (Presbyterian Committee of Publication, Richmond, Va., 200 pages, 75c.), it is shown by a comprehensive historical survey, that the church, in all ages, has been guided and inspired, more or less consciously, by these great principles.

Outlines of the Life of Paul, by Professor

William C. Shaeffer, D.D. (Sunday School Board of the Reformed Church, Philadelphia, 90 pages, cloth 40c., paper 25c.) is one of the volumes in the Heidelberg Teacher Training Course.

Mr. W. C. Pearce is the Superintendent of the Adult Department of the International Sunday School Association. His book, therefore, The Adult Bible Class: Its Organization and Work (The Westminster Press, Philadelphia), is authoritative. But it is much more,—it is explicit, comprehensive, thorough-going, in regard to the Adult Bible Class Movement, organization, management, and activities of the Class.

His Life; His Friends; His Great Purpose,—are three well made little books from the Hope Publishing Company, Chicago, of 226, 144, 212 pages respectively, and selling at 15c. each, or the "interwoven story", 30c., plus 7c. postage. The first contains an "interwoven story" of the life of Jesus; the second, the story of His four disciples; and the third, the life of Paul, all in the very words of scripture. The matter is well arranged, well printed, and ought to be very useful for devotional or family reading.

In, Radio-Active Texts, Bishop H. W. Warren, D.D., LL.D., works out, with rich suggestiveness the comparison of the energy residing in God's written words with the lately discovered force of radium. (The Sunday School Times Company, Philadelphia, 28 pages, 25c. postpaid).
