large for all which they humbly hope, they would find relief in the Introduction of the Laws and Regulations relative thereto, existing in the Mother Country, under such restrictions as the situation and circumstances of the Country require, and the widom of Parliament may think sit. The Petitioners therefore humbly pray that the House will be pleased to take their situation, individually, and as connected with the general good of the country, into its serious consideration; and bring forward a Bill to grant such relief as to the House may seem sit and expedient.
