CAPT. SCOTT'S DIARY

It Enhances the Glory of Every Man in the Expedition.

LONDON, April 21.—Lady Scott, the wife of Capt. R. Scott, who lost his life in the Antarctic, has written a letter to the newspapers in which she expresses her thanks for the sympathy extended to her in her bereavement, and thanks everybody for their generosity in subscriptions to memorial funds. She says that her husband's diary will be published in full as soon as practicable. "Every word in the diary," Lady Scott says, "goes to enhance the glory of the expedition and the work of every officer and man concerned in it."

Bishop Williams, of Huron, At Grace Church Last Evening—Eighteen Candidates.

5. The possession of the Holy Spirit.
6. The elevated position women and children occupy and the sacredness of life.

Bishop Williams, in his closing remarks advised those who were being confirmed, to let their manner of life be equal to their privilege, and also to communicate the blessings which had been theirs to others.

The choir rendered excellent music. The anthem was "Come Hilly Ghost our Souls Inspire," by Thomas Atwood. The newly confirmed will commune for the first time next Sunday. The attendance at the service was large.
