FAKE GAME IS EXPOSED TODAY IN POLICE COURT

Money Taken at Labor Bureau — Magistrate Scents a Fraud.

Arthur W. Webb, is a smooth customer, but, with all his smoothness, he could not throw mud in the face of Magistrate Livingston. He had run an intelligence office on Colborne street in partnership with two men named Stuart and Rush. They collected a sum of eighteen dollars, which is known to the authorities and then the office closed and the work which had been guaranteed in return for the cash was not forthcoming. Investigations resulted in a warrant being issued for the arrest of the absconding parties and this morning Webb appeared before the bench on a charge of fraud. He pleaded that the police had no authority to prosecute, but this plea was immediately rejected by the magistrate who said proceedings were taken under the Criminal Code.

The first witness called was Leon Shalit, who is a general confidante of the foreign element. His testimony was that an intelligence office had been opened at -103-1-2 Colborne St. about the beginning of March. It was carried on under the trade name of Webb and Stuart and after some business had been contracted it was closed up. It was only open for about one month. He had himself taken eighteen Russians to the office and for them had paid \$18. If work was not found the money was to be returned after various excuses for not getting employment for the Russians witness found the office closed up. He produced the receipt which was signed by Rush.

John Garrett giving evidence said he had lived in Brantford for some time and was now working for a contractor Lanis Shalit on Colborne St. He said he had come across Webb in Hamilton and by arrangement with Webb he was to go down to Hamilton from Brantford to obtain work from their Hamilton office. He paid a dollar to them in their Brantford office and was referred to the Hamilton branch. He was a carpenter and had been guaranteed work by the office kept by defendant. He had not got the work promised and when he arrived at the Hydro-Electric depot to which he was sent by defendant he was told that they knew nothing whatever of Webb. They did not require any help. He denied the suggestion which defendant made that he had been offered 22-1-2 cents per hour nor thirty as was in his agreement with defendant.

Webb then brought forth another feeble plank of his platform. He contended that Garrett had not gone to the correct man of the Hydro and was told that if there had been any work to get on the job that Garrett would have got started. A receipt was produced which purported that it was issued under the government of the Dominion.

Mr. Wilkes crown attorney doubted the suggestion printed upon the receipts that it was under the government license. It was a matter for investigation he thought. The receipt was misleading. The magistrate said there was no doubt government licensed them to take a dollar in return for employment but that dollar must be returned if work was not found.

Webb as he now says his name is Weber as he gave it to the police

last night said he was willing to repay all the men from whom money had been received. He however contended that Chief Slein had no right to prosecute; he had it from Ottawa that in his case, an immigration officer must lay the charge. Chief Smith of Hamilton had been prevented from prosecuting because of this. Taking the bull by the horns, Magistrate Livingston told the defendant to get that idea out of his head. Fraud had been perpetrated and the Criminal Code was in operation. Defendant said he was a victim, not knowing until yesterday that Rush had gone away with the cash. He blamed it all on Rush, and seemed to lay all the responsibility at his door. Again the magistrate saw the bend of things, and he remarked, "You as a firm have taken the money and you as a partner are responsible."

Webb retorted: "We are only asking for justice. The present prosecution conflicted with municipal by-laws." "Get that out of your mind," again advised the Bench. "The question is, are you willing to settle with these men, as you are liable."

Webb: "According to your municipal by-law the men were entitled to 60 per cent." Again he reiterated the fact that the police had no right to prosecute, however, he was willing to pay according to the Statute law, which was 50 per cent.

"You are trying to get behind the by-law and simply intend to sit upon your stools and get \$1 from the people and pay back 50 cents at the end of the week, answered the magistrate. The by-law did not provide for that sort of thing.

Webb: "We have had an office in Hamilton for seven years. I don't care if you have had an office there for 700 years," interposed the Bench. "This is Brantford."

Although asked by Crown Attorney Wilkes if he would settle up at that moment and so elucidate matters, Webb showed no inclination to do so, and spoke of issuing a warrant against Rush.

The manager of The Courier said when the advertisement was sent into the Courier Office, he suspected the alleged government authorization, and refused to insert the advertisement. He felt that defendant was the man behind the gun, and with his knowledge of Webb did not think it advisable to take the advertisement. Questioned by defendant Mr. Mills said he thought that his questioner was behind the gun because he had seen him on the street talking to the man who took the advertisement to the Courier Office. If it was actually authorized by the government it ought not to be.

Defendant did not think it profitable to question the witness further. "It looks to me rather crooked," said the magistrate.

"It certainly is crooked to me," commented Webb, "when the crooked person has run away."

"I don't think all the crookedness has run away yet," rejoined the magistrate. "However, the case will stand over until Monday."

This action was taken to see if defendant was earnest in his assertion that he would repay the money handed over to him. In view of his plea of the 50 per cent statute by-law, it is doubtful if the entire amount will be refunded, and some of the foreigners said they would be glad to take to 100 per cent on the spot.
