LOST ALL HIS SHIPS.

How Admiral Cervera Lost on a Desperate Chance. ADMIRAL CERVERA A PRISONER.

The Torn and Disabled Fleet Ran Ashore to Avoid Sinking or Capture—Prisoners of War Captured—Only One American Killed.

Ten miles west of the entrance of the harbor of Santiago de Cuba, July 3, 4 p.m., by Associated Press dispatch from Havana, July 4, via Kingston, July 4, 4 p.m.—Admiral Cervera's fleet, consisting of the armored cruiser Cristobal Colon, the Almirante Oquendo, Infanta Maria Teresa and Vizcaya, and two torpedo boat destroyers, the Pluton and the Furor, which had been held in the harbor of Santiago de Cuba for six weeks past by the combined squadrons of Rear Admiral Sampson and Commodore Schley, lies to-day at the bottom of the Caribbean Sea off the southern coast of Cuba.

The Spanish admiral is a prisoner of war on the auxiliary gunboat Gloucester, and 1,000 to 1,500 other Spanish sailors and sailors, all who escaped the frightful carnage caused by the shells from the American warships, are also held prisoners of war by the United States navy. The American victory is complete, and, according to the latest information obtainable at this time, the American vessels were practically untouched, and only one man was killed when the ships were subjected to the heavy fire of the Spaniards all the time the battle lasted.
