## Township Councils

## RALEIGH COUNCIL.

The above council met pursuant to adjournment on the 4th day of Aug., 1902, with the following members present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

**Communications.**  
From County Clerk, that county rate for 1902 is \$4,853.71.  
From County Clerk, that keep of paupers at the House of Refuge for year ending June 30th, 1902, was \$177.15.

From the Bank of Commerce, showing \$9,340.17 standing at the credit of the Township on June 30th last.  
From the Clerk of Harwich, that the fence on the grave pit at Cedar Springs was repaired at a cost of \$3.00, for which Raleigh should pay one-half.

From the Clerk of the city of Chatham, that the matter of opening up a new road from the 2nd Con. E. B. bet. lots 23 and 24, the city would procure one-half the road allowance from the Robertson and Inches estate. The Raleigh would procure the other half from the Fairbanks estate.

From the Clerk of Tilbury East submitting a copy of agreement in reference to the proposed line north of the McDougall main, in which each Township assumes an equal share of the cost of the work and unite in an effort to procure a grant from the County Council.

John Miller submitted notice to have the drainage drain repaired at once.

Richardson submitted notice that the Harwich drain was too small to carry off the water from Harwich and needed improving at once.

Fred. C. Jones submitted application for collector of rates for 1902 at a salary of \$150.

Thomas Wallace notified council that the M. P. R. was removing the iron pipe in the Government No. 1 drain at the concession road and preparing to build a bridge with cement walls with 14 feet in the clear, which he considered too narrow to be the water in times of freshets, the bridge should be at least 16 or 18 feet wide and should have a dam on its land or crops on the water side.

By reason of the water backing up he would let the Township responsible.

Petitions were received to allow Michael Higgins and W. F. Dillon to commute the statute labor for a term of years.

**Reports.**  
W. G. McGee, O. L. S., submitted report for the repair of the Towl drain, estimated cost of work \$816.50. The council appointed to investigate the 3rd concession bridge and diverted road reported that they had examined the site of the bridge but not interviewed the solicitor about the matter.

L. A. Pate reported he had a bridge over the Four Rod Road drain at the 10th concession road at a cost of \$400—Adopted.

P. J. Do reported he had the bridge over the Horne drain at the 9th concession, repaired at a cost of \$25.55, and a drain at the 13th concession, repaired at a cost of \$21.00—Adopted.

P. J. Do reported that Jas. Russell had accepted his statute labor in front of the 13th concession and would receive the same for three years for the same—Adopted.

James Hogg reported he had a bridge over the Government No. 2 drain opposite lot 9 repaired at a cost of \$37 and one opposite lot 8 repaired at cost of \$23.05—Adopted.

The Treasurer submitted his half yearly report showing a balance on hand June 30th, of \$9,411.13—Adopted.

Moved Doyle and Jenner, that the clerk of W. F. Dillon be referred to W. G. McGee, O. L. S., to examine and report on as soon as possible—Adopted.

Moved Barado and Pardo, that John Mounie be paid \$4.00 for the loss of a sheep killed by dogs as per certificate of James Chinnick, sheepmaster—Carried.

Moved Barado and Dolson, that the clerk of the commissioners of the Pilekone Works be referred to the clerk of the township to proceed with the necessary repairs at the pump house, once—Carried.

Moved Barado and Dolson, that the account of the 3rd division be referred to the clerk of the township to investigate and report.

Moved Barado and Dolson, that the account of the Merlin Mirror, \$55, for King voters' lists and \$4 for adding be paid—Carried.

Account of Nicholson, \$51, for printing reports laid over.

Moved Barado and Dolson, that the engine report on the Towl drain be referred to the clerk of the township to investigate and report.

Moved Barado and Dolson, that the account of the 1st division be referred to the clerk of the township to investigate and report.
