INTERNATIONAL S. S. LESSON FOR TO-MORROW.

The Golden Age—Exod. 32:1-8, 30-35. Read Exod. 32-35.

Golden Text—Little children, keep yourselves from idols.—1 John 5, 21.

Forty days have passed since the giving of the law, when these people had said, "all that the Lord hath spoken will we do," and now we see them violating this law. Surely the heart in deceitful above all things. There had been no real heart turning to God. They were simply swayed by their fears and by the presence of Moses.

This backsliding in Israel is universal; not even Aaron or the seventy who met God in the mountain protested when the people came to him with their frightful proposals. The people wanted something they could see to worship. A purely spiritual worship is impossible for the natural heart; any supposed worship to God, unless we worship Him in spirit and in truth we are not His worshippers. It is only such worship he seeks.

Aaron demands all their golden ear-rings, perhaps expecting to cool their idolatrous ardor; but people will give up gold and jewels for a false religion even more readily than we do perhaps for the true. They evidently were very earnest and sincere, but neither sincerity nor earnestness nor their faith in the idol they had made, saved them. Their hearts were revealed, called a false unto Jehovah, was a lie, following the offerings to the calf of gold. All this time Moses was talking with God at the mountain top, while Israel dishonored Him in the vale below reminding us of Jesus at God's right hand, as a high priest and intercessor.

In preparing to return and offer himself for his people in his wonderful love; he did not make little of their guilt, his love was too faithful for that. Here again we see a type of Christ.

Moses took the very best course on behalf of his people—as we all should do—went right to God Himself for those he loved. Moses did not try to belittle the people's sin in seeking their pardon; his confession was definite and ample; his broken prayer, from a broken and contrite heart. He asked if forgiveness was impossible that the penalty might fall on him and not on the guilty people.

Wonderful love, but God will not take an innocent man's life in place of the life of a guilty man. Christ, who "tasted death for everyman," is man, yet the Son of God, the head of our race.

"Surely He hath borne our griefs and carried our sorrows away," and "all we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way, and Jehovah hath laid on Him (Jesus) the iniquity of us all."

THE BRITISH ARTILLERYMEN.

Not One of Them Made a Miss—Made In Two Series At Petawawa.

Petawawa Artillery Camp, Ont., July 26.—The British artillerymen have become the marvel of the camp. Never has such precision been seen as was exhibited by the visiting team in its first practice here. The guns used were of 4.7 calibre and the range 6,000 yards.

The men have been trained by the instructors of the Royal Artillery of Great Britain. Not a man made a miss move during the two series fired. The commands were given by the officers in the fewest possible words, just sufficiently loud for the men for whom they were intended to hear.

The guns went into action with their detachments as though the men themselves were a part of the big machine, and were loaded, fired, manned forward, swung into position, etc., with a speed, accuracy and perfection of drill that has never been equalled in Canada.

Nearly everything was done by signal. The series was fired in about one-half the time usually occupied by the Canadian team.

The competitions were against thirty Canadian companies of heavy artillery which have already completed their shell practice before Sept. 15. The actual results of the firing will not be made public until all the competitions are completed.

The British team and Canadian composite field artillery team, commanded by Major F. W. B. Morrison of Ottawa, fired their elementary series yesterday.

TO REGULATE FISHING.

Binding Agreement Between U. S. and Canada Advocated.

Erie, Pa., July 26.—At the closing session of the National Fisheries Society an International Congress was arranged for and the Governor-General of Canada, the Lieutenant-Governor of the province of Ontario, President Roosevelt and the governors of the various states bordering on the Great Lakes will be requested to send delegates.

The congress is to make a binding agreement between the United States and the Dominion of Canada regulating the catch of fish in the Great Lakes.

A resolution was passed authorizing such a congress and the sentiment was unanimous that some steps ought to be taken immediately to bring about more cordial and fairer relations between the two Governments relative to the fishing industry.

A paper bearing directly on the subject was read yesterday afternoon by A. Kelly Evans of Toronto, who maintained that it was absolutely necessary to regulate the size of commercial fish to prevent a possible prohibition of exports of the food varieties. Canada is now contributing 86 per cent. of the lake fish consumed in the United States, he said, and if this supply were cut off he believed it would be a severe blow to this country.

MUCH LUMBER DESTROYED.

Big Blaze at Ottawa Caused Loss Estimated at \$300,000.

Ottawa, July 26.—W. C. Edwards' planing mills and sash and door factory in the New Edinburgh section, the factory of the Library Bureau alongside, a mica warehouse owned by the Messrs. Blackburn, No. 6 Fire Hall, the club room of W. C. Edwards Co.'s staff, two million feet of lumber, and several small residences were destroyed by fire, which was started by lightning at 5.30 yesterday morning, with a loss of \$300,000, of which \$250,000 falls upon the W. C. Edwards Co. about 250 men are out of employment.

The Edwards Co. are covered by insurance to the extent of \$200,000. Senator W. C. Edwards of Rockland was the principal owner of these industries, and was also largely interested in the Library Bureau.

Excitement in Georgia.

Atlanta, Ga., July 26.—Rarely have such scenes of excitement been witnessed in legislative halls as has marked the efforts to pass the state prohibition bill by the lower branch of the Legislature. All day the fight was waged, and a filibustering majority prevented action on the bill which was adopted by the Senate more than a week ago.

Hundreds of men, women and children thronged the galleries. Women, singing and waving flags, added to the excitement. Those of several Atlanta churches prepared luncheons for the legislators, and served them in the capitol. Late last night the prohibition bill had not been reported.

Centennial At Ottaville.

Woodstock, July 26.—The centennial jubilee of the founding of the pretty little village of Ottaville, 16 miles from here, was fittingly celebrated. Hundreds of visitors, some from quite a distance.

There were many happy reunions. It is estimated that 2,000 people were on the grounds. An interesting feature was the celebration of the 100th birthday of Mrs. Mahoney.

Two Months For This Man.

Ottawa, July 26.—Frank Lee, who attempted suicide in Labrador, some time ago, and who narrowly escaped with his life, was arraigned before Judge Talbot in Hall yesterday.

He pleaded guilty and was sent down for two months.

Cost of Conference.

London, July 26.—According to an official return the cost of the imperial conference was £10,400. The original estimate was £800.

The Admiralty expenses in conveying the remains of Hon. Mr. Prefontaine from Cherbourg to Halifax was £3,781.

Arrival of 1,200 Japs.

Vancouver, July 26.—Twelve hundred Japanese from Honolulu arrived at Vancouver yesterday on board the British tramp steamer Kumeria. The steamer lay out in the stream all day.

The customs revenue of the Dominion continues to grow at a marvelous rate, and illustrates the wonderful expansion of commerce which is taking place in Canada.

The receipts for the month of June were: 1907-\$5,321,444.83; 1906, \$4,063,421.37; increase, \$1,258,023.46. For the three months ended June 30 the increase was \$2,964,391.40, the figures being: 1906, \$12,158,701.03; 1907, \$15,123,092.43.
