To inquire into (a) the general subject of life insurance systems in Canada; (b) the operations of the various companies chartered by the Paralament of Canada, or of any province, and licensed under the Insurance Act, transacting life insurance in Canada, including expenses of management, investment of funds and other allied questions.

2. To make the like inquiry, so far as deemed necessary, into the opera-tions of companies, other than those chartered by the Dominion or provinces, transacting in Canada the business of ife insurance.

3. To inquire into the operation of the laws of the Parliament of Canada relating to and governing the business of life insurance, both as regards Canadian companies and companies other than Canadian, and to consider and report upon any amendments thereto that may be deemed necessary.

4. That the commissioners so appointed have power to employ expert assistance, to summon before them witnesses and require them to give evidence, on oath, orally or in writing, or on solemn affirmation, if they are persons entitled to affirm in civil matters, and to produce such documents and things as such commissioners deem requisite to the full investigation of matters hereinbefore refered. things as such commissioners deem re-quisite to the full investigation of mat-ters hereinbefore referred to, and gen-erally to exercise all the powers conferred by the said act.
