TWO-THIRDS OF

Ottawa, Dec. 30.—About two-thirds of the exportable surplus of the Canadian wheat crop has already been sold and exported through the medium of the Canada Wheat Board, the sole purchasing agency of the government. The total is variously calculated from 75,000,000 to 100,000,000 bushels, the quantity in the hands of the farmers not being known exactly.

While no definite figures have been received here from the Wheat Board, which is given a free hand, a fair proportion of the supply is moving to the United States since the embargo was
