The annual harvest thanksgiving service was held in St. Marks church, Nelson last Wednesday evening. The ladies did their best to make the interior of the church a picture of flowers, fruit, and grain mingling together. To their patient and dexterous work much credit is due. They don't take too much sleep, being on foot as early as two o'clock in the morning. Potatoes, turnips, carrots, cabbage, bread, fruit, when they can get it, is the bill of fare day in and day out. Fish, eggs, milk, butter and cheese are the luxuries with them. They are healthy and live long.

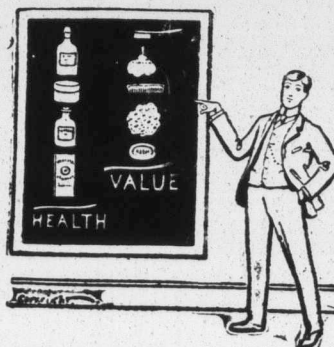
