### Butter And Cheese

Canada's Trade with United States in these Commodities

In 1919 the United States reached its peak in the export of butter, the amount going abroad that year being 33,739,960 lbs, of which 203,372 lbs came to Canada. In 1917 our neighbors exported 66,050,013 lbs of cheese, that year being their busiest in that commodity. Of this amount 460,050 lbs came to Canada. Our best export year in these products was 1920, where 37,444,172 lbs of butter imported by the United States we supplied 10,693,311 lbs, and of 15,993,725 lbs of cheese imported by that country we furnished 6,031,404 lbs. But last year was very exceptional for, in the first twenty years of the century, our imports from the United States of butter amounted in all to 13,554,553 lbs and our exports to 9,394,981 lbs, and of cheese to 12,607,143 lbs in imports and 4,931,015 lbs in exports.

Reverting to the year the world war broke out, namely 1914, we find that the United States imported 7,200,699 lbs of butter of which we only supplied 500,623 lbs, and 55,477,144 lbs of cheese of which 1,316,128 lbs was from this country, or less than one fortieth. Taking the years 1910 to 1918, official figures issued both from Ottawa and Washington show that Canada imported practically 60 per cent more butter from the United States than she sent to that country. The greatest disparity, however, was in cheese, as in those years we imported from the United States no less than 10,314,594 lbs while we only supplied to that country 2,743,583 lbs. In the last six years the United States has exported 245,19,429 lbs of cheese against 31,370,357 lbs in the previous six years and imported 108,655,646 lbs against 287,205,591 lbs. In the same period, that is in the last six years, Canada exported to the United States 6,724,692 lbs of cheese and imported from there 8,124,693 lbs, and in the previous six years exported to the United States 2,372,447 lbs and imported from that country 2,935,905 lbs. Thus in each case we imported more than we exported. Of butter in the last half dozen years Canada exported to the United States 16,277,598 lbs and imported from that country 7,136,639 lbs. In the previous six years we exported to the United States 2,724,400 lbs and imported from there 3,121,412 lbs.

That the trade of the United States in dairy products exceeds greatly in exports is proven by the fact that for the last four years the average value in exports has been \$97,711,557 while the imports from all countries have only averaged \$15,902,570, or less than one sixth. The manufacture of condensed milk increased enormously in the United States during the war. The demand having since fallen off, it is evident that there must either be a lessening in the production of milk or the surplus must be used for the making of butter and cheese.

## TO DIG FOR GOLD IN THE STRAIT OF NORTHUMBERLAND

A Party of Six Will Search For Treasure Which Tradition Says Was Buried By French Frigate In the Year 1758 On Caribou Island.

Pictou, N. S., May 21—Treasure hunters of Trenton, New Glasgow and Caribou, six in all, have banded together to dig for a long buried pot of gold, or chests of money, which they believe are hidden beneath the soil of Caribou Island, twelve miles from Pictou. The island is located in the Northumberland strait, off the mouth of the Caribou river and is situated between Pictou Island and the mainland.

Caribou Island residents, who are few in number, have held the idea for a long time that the crew of a French frigate on her way to Quebec late in the fall of the year 1758 had taken off a large amount of gold destined to pay the French forces in Quebec and buried it on the island for safe-keeping, the commanders rearing it to fall into the hands of the English vessels which at the time circumvented the mouth of the St. Lawrence river. The tradition goes that as winter came on the vessel feared to go to the St. Lawrence, but wintered in the ice in Pictou or Shediac harbor, leaving the money on the island so that it would not fall into hands of the enemy.

Several of the residents say that they have observed signs of digging on the island. They have engaged the services of a mineral rod expert recently who went over the ground. He is reported as saying that prospects for precious metal are exceedingly bright. The place where the supposed treasure is buried is at the east end of the island near the famous Gull Rock lighthouse, a spot as yet untouched by the hand of the bulldozer or summer tourist.

The locality will be ploughed up and at thorough excavation made, capital having been furnished by six men of the place named.

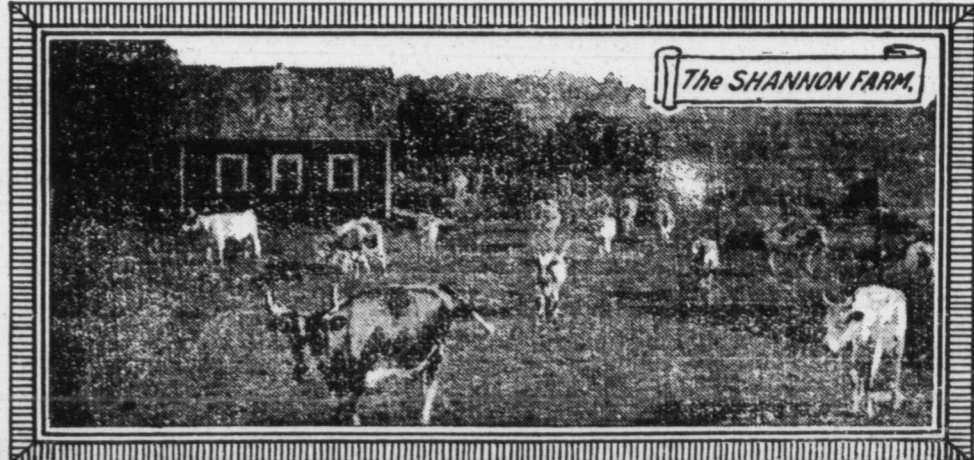

## Pure-Bred Stock at Cloverdale, B.C.



The South side of the Fraser River Valley is known as the best dairy farming district in British Columbia. Some of this most fertile land has been farmed for thirty and forty years and is paying its owners back with full interest for all their toil of clearing it. All the biggest farmers are going in hot and strong for purebred stock, chiefly Holsteins, Jerseys and Ayrshires and nearly all of them have the latest type of cow-house and most up-to-date appliances.

One of the largest and oldest farms is that of Shannon Brothers who were born and bred in the neighborhood and settled on their present farm of two hundred and

thirty-five acres when it was forest land thirty-five years ago. Their hard work has turned the standing bush into acres of verdant meadow and rich fields of grain producing 100 bushels of oats to the acre.

The specialty is purebred Ayrshires. They have a herd of eighty-four head of cattle, counting bulls and calves, and so famous have they become for this breed that their stock is continually being shipped all over British Columbia, to the States and even across the Pacific to Hong-Kong.

One of their cows, "Grandview Rose," whose sire came straight from Scotland, is supposed to be the

best Ayrshire in the British Empire and has a wonderful record of 21,428 lbs. milk and 1,035 lbs. butter fat in 364 days. The Shannons think little of paying \$1,000 for a bull-calf, such is their great regard for pedigree and breeding to type.

All the milking is done by an electric machine and the cow-house is modern in every detail even to the use of a litter-carrier. As in all dairy farms in B. C. the cattle are silo-fed throughout the winter, a mixture here of oats and vetch.

The milk is all bottled right on the farm, after going through a scientific cooling process, and 70 gallons of it are shipped every morning, chiefly to Vancouver. H. G. W.
