THE MAIN JOHN GLASIER
Ven. Archdeacon Raymond in his
interesting work on The River St.
John extracts from which have been
published from time to time in The
St. John Telegraph has the following
upon the phrase: "The Main John
Glazier":—

"Senator Glasier was the first lum-
berman to bring a drive over the
Grand Falls, and is said to have been
the first white man to explore the
Squatook lake. The phrase "The
Main John Glazier" originated with
an Irishman named Paddy McGar-
rigle, who was employed as a cook.
It was soon universally adopted by
the lumbermen and, strange to say,
has spread over the continent. In
the western states today men em-
ployed in lumbering apply the words
"the main John Glazier" to the
manager of any big lumbering con-
cern. It is said that only a few of
those who use the term know of its
origin. It was undoubtedly carried
to the west by lumbermen who went
there from the River St. John.

65,000,000 MARKS SEIZED
BY FRENCH

000 marks from German railway

SOUND AS A BELL

FEDERAL MEMBERS MUST BE ASLEEP

Prominent Moncton business men, in discussing the situation created by the establishment of the boundary of this division of the Canadian National Railways at River du Loup instead of at Montreal, expressed the belief that this will greatly decrease the business coming over those portions of the roads in the Maritime Provinces. They maintain that the two best paying sections of the system, namely from Levis to Montreal and from River du Loup to Levis, have been transferred to the central division for the purpose of increasing the revenue of that section rather than because economic reasons warrant their transfer.

They are of the opinion that instead of routing export products over the I. C. R. section of the road to Halifax and St. John, henceforth, still more freight will be shipped over the section of the Grand Trunk to Port-
land, thus further cutting down the revenue of the lines in the Maritimes.

Delegation is Urged
F. E. Dennison, chairman of the local board of trade expressed the opinion that a strong delegation from all points of the Maritime Provinces should go to Ottawa by special train and lay the situation as it confronts these provinces, directly before the Government. He thought that the members of parliament for the Mar-
time constituencies did not fully realize how serious a state of affairs was threatening this part of Canada, and probably many were of the opinion that only Moncton would be affected, but this was not true because in cut-
ting down the total mileage of this railway division and taking away the best paying sections of it, the road was opened up for poorer service and still higher rates.

One prominent citizen thought that the members from the Maritime Provinces must be asleep, else they
