But notcontent with this outrage upon custom and precedent, they have altered Mr. Edgar's indictment against Caron so that it contains charges which he never made, and which he has no means of proving, and illuminates the specific charges so that John Boyd, vice-president; Thos. Indeed so general, for some reason, was the reputation of the minister of justice for fairness and uncompromising honesty, and so fervent were his promises to rid the party of corruption at all costs, that it is not too much to say that many liberals hoped that at least we would have a situation an honest government for a time. Recent events, however, have shown, to the bitter disappointment we venture, of many conservatives as well as liberals, that the hope and the confidence were alike misplaced.
