### Sample Grit Campaign Tactics.

LATE revelations have cast a flood of light on the campaign tactics pursued by the Grit candidate, Mr. Guité, in the recent Bonaventure election. About one third of the electors of the constituency are Protestants; consequently Mr. Guité, after considering the best methods of arousing in his favor the prejudices of both Catholics and Protestants, determined to issue two circulars, one to be distributed among the Catholics and the other to be distributed among the Protestants. The circular sent round among the Protestants was headed "Hurrah for Laurier, and Independence of Clerical Influence," and continued as follows: "All honor to Mr. Guité! In our country independent men like Mr. Guité are rare, and we ought to give him our confidence and our votes. If Mr. Guité had been willing to sign the ultimatum of the Bishop of Rimouski, he would have been elected by acclamation. He prefers to fight rather than become a slave and lose his independence. All honor to him. By signing that declaration Mr. Guité would have ignored the fact that in Bonaventure more than one third of the electors are Protestants who cling to liberty of conscience and wish to put an end to the racial struggles which are ruining the province and the Dominion."

The circular to the Catholics was in a different strain. To the French Canadian electors, Mr. Guité said:

"The Manitoba school question has reached its present phase through the criminal negligence of the Conservative party, which, by a word or a stroke of the pen, could have prevented the Greenway Government from putting into force the law of 1890, which abolished separate schools, by disallowing the Bill in accordance with the power conferred upon the Federal Government by the Constitution. The Conservative party has shamefully deceived, insulted and humiliated our reverend Episcopate by refusing their just demands for the disallowance of the Bill so as to wipe the Greenway school legislation out of existence. This same Conservative party caused the death, through disappointment and chagrin, of the venerable Bishop of St. Boniface, Mgr. Tache, to whom it had given a promise to re-establish separate schools. In its hatred of the French and the Catholics, this same Conservative party, in spite of the opposition of Messrs. Laurier and Blake, incorporated the Orange Order, that sect of fanatics which works for the destruction of our religion. The Liberal party, on the other hand, under the Hon. Mr. Mercier, was the first to install as the deputy minister of a department a priest of our religion, Mgr. Labelle, with a salary of \$3,000 a year. It was the Liberal party which, after years of vain promises on the part of the Conservatives, paid \$400,000 to the Jesuits as indemnity for the property of which they had been unjustly robbed by the English Government. It was the Hon. Mr. Laurier who, on the floor of the House of Commons, and in the presence of the Orangemen of Toronto protested with all his might and the energy of his superb elocution against the miserable attempt to disallow the Jesuits Estate Act. It was again Mr. Laurier who on the floor of Parliament denounced the execution of Riel by the Tory party. In this instance, again, the voice of the Episcopate had asked for executive clemency to spare the life of the Metis leader. Once more the clergy and the Episcopate were treated as pariahs, with scorn and disdain, and Riel was hanged. The Church has not pronounced against Mr. Laurier. The august voice of the Pope has not made itself heard, and when the illustrious father speaks he will render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and unto Mr. Laurier the things that are Mr. Laurier's." Mr. Guité has shown by these tactics that he is well qualified to be a member of the organized hypocrisy led by Laurier and Tarte. We notice that the hiring of the Morning Organ has not raised his voice against this outrageous and scandalous deception. Oh no! nothing but approval need be expected from that quarter, of any conduct no matter how vile and scandalous, that may contribute towards depriving Catholics of their rights, and strengthening the hands of the arch-traitor, Laurier.

## Mendacity Unmasked.

No statement, in connection with the "Settlement" of the Manitoba school question has been more persistently reiterated by the supporters of the Government or by the Government press than that the terms of "Settlement" agreed upon by Laurier and Greenway are more advantageous to the Manitoba minority than the proposals made to the Greenway Government by the Commissioners sent to Winnipeg by the Government of Sir McKenzie Bowell.

We have already pointed out the fallacy of this contention, on the part of the Laurier Government and its supporters, by comparing the terms in the respective propositions of settlement. We have evidently silenced our local contemporaries by thus exposing the untenableness of the arguments advanced by them. It appears, however, that in other places members and supporters of the Government have been harping on this false statement of the superiority of the Laurier-Greenway terms. Mr. Laurier himself, a few days ago, when campaigning in Wright County, endeavored to impress upon the Catholic electors there that the minority in Manitoba got more by the terms of his "settlement" than the Conservatives were willing to give. Curiously enough, the papers that published the account of Mr. Laurier's lying speech, in the same issues published reports of the debate in the Manitoba Legislature, ratifying the terms of the Laurier-Greenway "Settlement." In the course of his speech Mr. Cameron, Attorney-General of Manitoba, and one of the Commissioners appointed by the Greenway Government to confer with the delegates of the Conservative Government at Ottawa, spoke as follows regarding the very point under review: "He wished to deal with a particular charge. It was stated that the government had dealt perditionally, as the settlement was substantially the same as the offer of the Dominion Commissioners a year before. If such were really the case the provincial government would have been guilty and susceptible of condemnation. But such was not the case, and was indeed very far from the case. He referred to the offer of the Dominion Commissioners to prove this. The first clause of that offer was compulsory; that without consulting the wishes of anyone, as soon as there were sufficient Roman Catholic children there must be a separate school which should be taught by a Roman Catholic teacher. The Dominion Commissioners further asked for separate text-books, statutory representation on the advisory board, and a separate normal school, none of which things were to be found in the settlement. Thus there was no resemblance between the offer of the Dominion Commissioners and the bill before the house to-day." Surely this makes it sufficiently plain that either Mr. Laurier, the Patriot, or the Morning Organ, and all those who have been reiterating the statement that the terms of the Laurier-Greenway "settlement" were better than the terms offered by the Conservatives have been lying, or that Mr. Cameron is lying. Let the public judge who has been guilty of the greatest mendacity. There is a homely adage which says that liars require to have good memories, and it has been amply proven in the case under review.

## The Recall of the Eastern Churches

The Christian conquest of the East, the proper task of the Greek Church, and a task for which its territorial

The pestiferous malarial mentioned. He adds that a few weeks ago he was informed by Father Seguin, a former missionary in the Province of Yunnan, the very home of the plague, that the latter had personally administered ipecac to more than a thousand plague-stricken people; and that in every case a cure was effected, while the great majority of those patients who had not taken this treatment succumbed to the disease. As the plague has recently caused considerable havoc among Europeans living in India, the knowledge of so effective a remedy is of patent interest.

We are so used to untruths from non-Catholic writers when dealing with Catholic countries that a honest statement of facts has the suddenness and delight of a new revelation. We have had frequent occasion to acknowledge the services rendered to historic truth by Mr. Charles F. Lummis. In the March Harper's he again speaks out bravely for the Spanish pioneers in Mexico, whom it is the vulgar fashion to deify. "No other nation," says Mr. Lummis, "has founded so extensively such beneficence in its colonies, and few colonies have built so well on their inheritance. It is a useful Delartean attitude for the mind to try to 'fancy' England peopling New England with schools, hospitals, asylums and churches for Indians. But that is what infamous Spain did, three hundred years ago, up and down a space which measures something over one hundred and three New England. We may pick flaws in these institutions as administered while we were hanging witches; but the institutions were there, and are there yet." The jingo politician had a predecessor in the jingo historian; but their inquiries have found them out. With intelligent people, both are as dead as Caesar.

If one is saddened at the thought of the great number of historical fallacies that are current against the Church, there is consolation in the fact that many of them are being exploded. It used to be believed that John Wyclif was the first to translate the Bible into English. Of course there was Sir Thomas More's testimony to the contrary—"The whole Bible was, long before Wyclif's days, by virtuous and well-learned men translated into the English tongue, and by good and godly people with devotion and soberness well and reverently read." The sainted Lord Chancellor of England was a Catholic, however, and his testimony counted for nothing. But now comes a Protestant, George Haven Patnam, who in his recently published work, "Books and their Markers During the Middle Ages," states (as calmly as though the contrary had never once been asserted) that there were translations of the Bible before Wyclif took up his quill; and, furthermore, that his translation was probably made up in some degree from "those" previously existing. (Page 13, vol. II.) In the notice of Wyclif in Lippincott's Biographical Dictionary it is asserted that until his time it was regarded as an act of heresy to translate the Bible, and that Wyclif's version of it became "an engine of wonderful power against Romanism." It would seem that historical research is becoming a powerful engine against Protestantism.
