The Winnipeg Four.

The cable despatch tells of this crew carrying off the Stewards' Cup at Henley. This is the first time the cup has left England. Their methods excited much criticism in England. What Henley experts say they should not do, they do. Altogether their work aroused much attention. The crew are as follows: F. P. Carruthers, bow; C. E. Allen, 2; G. E. Aldous, 3; C. S. Riley, stroke. The stroke was in St. John's recently, and will be remembered by many. Their average weight is 11 at 7 lbs., and they are a well-set-up lot of men. They were disqualified for a collision in a recent Regatta on the Thames.

Mr. Wareham's Trap Found.

John Ware of Petty Harbor picked up Mr. Wareham's trap on Petty Hr. Monday yesterday morning. In getting it on board with only one man and a boy he was not able to get the thing clear of the bottom and cut away part of the bottom and the leader. The repairs to the trap will cost about \$50. Mr. Ware put the trap on the Government wharf at Petty Harbor and sent word to Mr. Wareham of the south side, St. John's. Mr. Wareham soon got his gasoline launch and went to Petty Harbor yesterday afternoon and got the trap. When it was brought to Mr. Wareham's wharf and examined he found that it was greatly damaged and would require 50 fathoms of twine to mend it. Mr. Ware asked \$50 for bringing in the trap. Mr. Wareham considers this too much.

The Prospero Arrives.

The s.s. Prospero, Capt. Kean, arrived from the northward at 7 this morning. She had a fine passage up and down and brought a full cargo, including a lot of whale oil from Trinity and a large lot of salmon. The ship went down as far as Battle Harbor and called at Quirpon and all the other ports. Capt. Kean reports the fishery north as almost a blank for both traps and hook. There is a sign of fish in deep water. There is no caplin of any account and no bait to be had. The ship had it very stormy with heavy rain and some lightning and thunder in Pilley's Island Wednesday night. The whalers are doing poorly, and the Hawk at Cape Charles has only 2 fish. The Hump has landed 14 fish at Trinity. The Prospero spoke the Ingraham at Griquet Sunday. She had a fishery report similar to the Invermore. Capt. Kean thinks that the only hope for the northern fishery is the appearance of squid. Nothing has been done with caplin and it looks as if the traw fishery will be completely failure as the season is too far advanced to do much. The passengers by the ship were: Messrs. Development at the Mine, Twillingate.

By the Prospero we learn that Mr. Obadiah Hodder, Manager of the Grand Northern Copper Co., is rushing things at the mine in Twillingate. He brought with him from New York, in May, considerable machinery which is being put in running order at the mine, for mining and loading ore. A part of this machinery is a conveyor with a capacity of 500 tons an hour, by which the ore will be carried from the bins and dropped into the hole of a ship at the pier. Within a week or so this pier will be completed. Daily over 50 men are working on the construction, from early morning till late in the evening, putting in some days 15 hours' time. There will be sufficient water at the head of the pier for a very large ship to load. Everything is being done with a view to handling a large quantity of ore, both in mining and shipping. Besides the superintendence of the loading wharf at the mine, Sloop Cove, Mr. Hodder is having landed in Twillingate Harbor a large quantity of wharf sticks, for the building of a pier for the Hodder Supply Co., business in the metropolis of the north.

Newfoundlander Champion Pugilist.

It will be interesting to note at this particular juncture that a Newfoundland in the sixties held the title of champion of the world in the domain of pugilism. This was John J. Dwyer, of St. John's who left here in early childhood, and who was born in the West End, near the Cross Rd. He was a man of splendid physique, an all round athlete and a very clever boxer with a capacity for taking and certainly for returning unlimited punishment. He defeated several noted pugilists and few men of his mould would stand against him. A right hand punch from him if properly placed was generally effective, and in the latter part of his career, though he issued repeated challenges no one could be had to enter the lists with him. His brother was alderman of Brooklyn for several years and his cousin at one time was said to be the strongest man in Brooklyn. He worked with Captain Pendergast, also a St. John's man, and a contractor for stevedoring and it was this man who was sent to see Dwyer, who was a giant in stature, storing cargo and running along the decks of ships with casks of oil in his arms. Old timers here will remember the family.

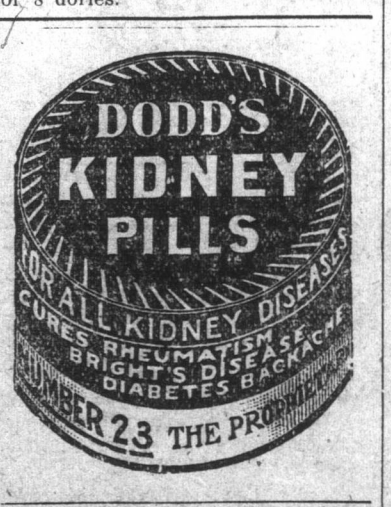
