The plank beds there are also a source of danger, and the wonder is that more are not hurt in falling upon them. The possibility f of accidents to prisoners gives the men on guard much worry, but they cannot remain in the cells with prisoners and are not in a position to avert such happenings. For the safety of prisoners the police say that the floor should be planked, the walls ceiled to about five feet in height, and that the present bed should be done away with. The cells are warm, and and there would be less danger of very careful of prisoners, and undoubtedly they are, but while the cells remain as they are at present it will be hard to obviate accidents.
