47 Arbitrations.

Yesterday afternoon the gentlemen who will conduct the arbitrations on land through which the Trepansey branch Railway will run, went over the properties effected and surveyed, beginning at Waterford Bridge and ending at Brenocks. 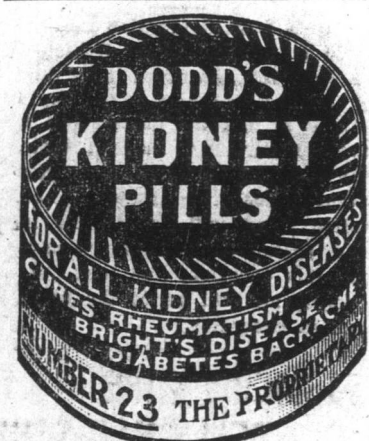
Splendidly Kept Park.

Warship Contracts Not Awarded.

OTTAWA, To-day. A hitch has developed in respect to awarding contracts for the construction of warships in the Canadian Naval Service. Tenders called some time ago were sent in by British firms. These were opened at the beginning of the month. But it was stated by Broder in reply to a question in the House of Commons that while they had been received no decision had been reached. Later Broder left for London for the Imperial Conference and as Admiral Kingsmill is also away, nothing can be done with regard to letting contracts. There will be no special issue of stamps by the Dominion Government at the Coronation. The head of King George will appear on the regular issue of stamps within a few months. In England the issue bearing the new King's head will be placed on sale on June 1st.

The ship had moderate weather on the run down the St. Lawrence, but she had it foggy after leaving Sydney and made the run from there in 50 hours. She made the run down in 10 days from Montreal.

Hints to Householders.

PROFESSOR HENRY ADAMS in his Presidential Address to the Institute of Sanitary Engineers early in 1908, said: "Gas fires for heating are already widely adopted for offices, consulting rooms where a fire may be required at short notice. I have had nothing else in my office for the last thirty years and do not find any of the ill effects that have been ascribed to them."

Gas fires are universally used by Medical men in London, and they recommend them for use in the homes of their patients.

The Coal Smoke Abatement Society, among whose members are many men of high scientific and artistic attainments, are strong advocates of the use of gas for heating. The Society carried out a most elaborate series of tests with gas fires, etc., in May and June, 1906.

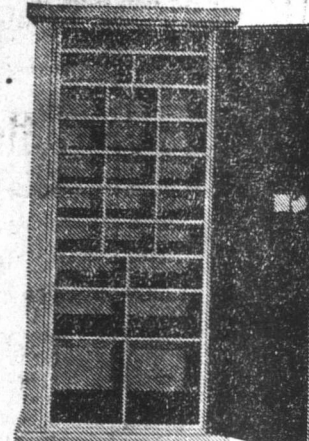
