Millions on Verge of Starvation in China.

Special Evening Telegram. New York, To-Day. Three millions in Central China on the verge of starvation reads a statement issued by the China Famine Relief Committee: "Last summer the worst floods for forty years destroyed crops on an area of 50,000 square miles. Many have already died of hunger. Unless prompt relief is given, multitudes of men, women and children must perish. No harvest expected until May, when the famine will be growing daily more acute."

Grey is Made Knight of the Garter.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The King has appointed Sir Edward Grey Knight of Garter. This distinction is limited to members of Royal families, a few of the highest among nobility. It has been conferred upon Grey, undoubtedly, at the Premier's suggestion, and is construed as the Government's answer to attacks, particularly on the part of Liberals, on Sir Edward's foreign policy.

Large Number of Fatalities.

Special to Evening Telegram. ANTONIENHETTE, Prussian Silesia, To-Day. A large number of fatalities were caused in one of the collieries in the coal mining centre last evening. Seven corpses of miners were brought to the surface and the authorities believe that 20 more men perished.

Last Night's Lecture.

Rev. J. W. Bartlett lectured on "Charles Dickens" at Cochrane Street Basement last evening. Rev. W. H. Webber, the Pastor, occupied the chair, and Mr. A. W. Mews presided at the organ. The lecturer spoke for over an hour and analyzed the character of the great novelist and incidentally showed his great admiration for the works from which he quoted choice passages that were interspersed with pathos and humour. He remarked that in recent years a marked change had taken place in the opinion of the British public regarding Dickens. His novels were free from the slightest tinge of immorality, and to quote the tribute paid by Thackeray, "could be safely put into the hands of his daughter." Mr. Burt in moving a vote of thanks remarked that there were a good many volumes of Dickens in the S. S. Library, but the demand was very limited on the part of the readers.

Florizel Here.

The S. S. Florizel, Capt. Williams, reached port at 3 p.m. yesterday from New York direct after a passage of 90 hours. The ship left there at 6 p.m. Thursday last and had fair weather until Saturday night and Sunday when a gale from the N. W. was experienced and it was intensely cold, the result being that the hull and decks were pretty badly iced up. She met a considerable body of slob ice west of Cape Race, and after steaming through that made a good run to port. She brought a fair cargo and her passengers were: P. Power and S. Aylward. The ship also brought a mail and after discharging will be made ready for the sealing voyage.
