BERLIN, Oct. 21.
Lieutenant Gerick, winner of last year's balloon race in the United States, and head of the German Defenders' Races to be held at Stuttgart on Saturday next, was killed today. His aide, Lieut. Sterler was also killed.

Just now the ultimate consumer is the object of tender solicitude on the part of the office-seeking class. It is the ultimate consumer who elects presidents in this country, and if he should get his back up and refuse to vote there wouldn't be anything left of the electoral college but the remains and the floral offerings.

Will Increase Tariff.

At the L. S. P. U. Rooms last night the Truckmen's Union held a special meeting, there being a large number of members present. A scale of revised rates was considered and this applies to all kinds of trucking work. This will take effect on the 4th of November and this procedure was found to be necessary owing to the greatly increased price of hay, oats, feed, etc., and also on account of the greater cost of repairs to vehicles, horse shoeing and other work. The fact that working teams on Water St. now wears out wheelbands, shoes and other gear more quickly than heretofore weighed with the Union in their conclusion. Under present conditions the work does not pay and many have preferred to give up their horses and engage with others at a weekly wage.

Stopped Whaling.

Yesterday afternoon a message was received from Capt. Bull, of the whaler Cabot, saying that he was giving up the voyage. The weather for some time past has been stormy and the prospects for taking more fish were not encouraging. The cabin to date has forty fish, twenty-five of which were taken at Balena and fifteen at Snook's Arm. Last year the captain had fifty-nine whales.
