News has reached here that Crown
Prince Daniel is marching northward with the Montenegrin army, in
connection with preparations which
are being made to resist the Alsterian
attack on Cettinje. All heights dominating the road from Cattare to Cettinje are being hastily equipped with
heavy artillery, and strong Montenegrin forces supported by Servian
troops are taking up positions in the
mountains. Montenegro has been furmountains. Montenegro has been furnished by Servia with sufficient provisions for Montenegrin army to last three months. A despatch to the Mail from Trieste says 8,000 troops are assembled near the Montenegrin fron-tier. The Mail's correspondent at Gratse, Austria, says: It is stated that Austria is planning for a military advance which will not be confined to Montenegro. Troops will be sent in transports to Southern Albania. Meanwhile troop trains are crowded with riflemen from the Austrian Alps, proceeding south. The Mail's Bel-grade correspondent says an alliance clearly provides concentrated military action in the event of an attack by Austria. Even if such an attack is sanctioned by the great Powers there is no cause for pessimism. This was the only official utterance that Spath, Miss Keegan, L. J. Inpp, C. L. could be obtained regarding the result of the momentous conference of the Ambassadors of the Powers on the Balkan situation. The conference lasted 'more than three hours.
