**Cement From Beets.** It is now reported that a French firm is making an excellent cement from a by-product in the process of making beet sugar. The scum that forms when the beets are boiled, and which has heretofore been thrown away, consists largely of carbonate of lime and water, and from 70,000 tons of beet treated 4,000 tons of carbonate of lime are obtained; to this 1,100 tons of clay are added, the excellent cement.

The scum is pumped into large tanks, where it is allowed to dry partially; finely-divided clay is then mixed with it; the mixture is thoran hour and burned in a rotary kiln, much in the same way as Portland MINARD'S LINIMENT CURES cement. A new method of treating fractures has just been announced by Dr. H. J. Kauffer. He dries and grinds to pow der a piece of fresh bone, and this powder he mixes to the consistency of a paste with petrolatum, and pro perly sterilizes the mixture. After the ends of the fractured bone have been brought into proper relations, and warmed bone mixture, and the needle is inserted to the seat of the fracture and as deeply as possible between the fractured ends. The contents o the needle are then injected as the needle is slowly withdrawn to the surface of the bone, when the injunction must stop. This procedure may be repeated several times at different angles, thus filling the entire space between the fractured ends with the
