Is Italy Joining the Turkish Campaign?

If it is true, as reported by Turkey officially, that the Turkish battleship Kheyyed Din Barbarossa was sunk by an Italian submarine, it is the first act of war of Italy against Turkey, which has come to our attention, and may be the beginning of the co-operation of Italy with the Allies to bring Turkey to her knees. The report that Italy would send 550,000 fresh troops either to France or the Dardanelles within the next three weeks, according to a Capt. Victor del Francis who arrived in New York yesterday, if indeed it has any foundation in fact, is palpably exaggerated. Italy is engaged in a struggle with Austria over ground which in many respects is at least as difficult as the Gallipoli hills and valleys, and though her armies have already accomplished wonders they have much still fighting to do before they can call the sonso line their own, and considerable additional force will be required for the advance to the Istrian peninsula and the reduction of Trieste, Fiume and Pola, which would also mean the capture of the Austrian fleet, and considering these problems to solve, and considering that twelve months ago, the first line of the army consisted of but 310,000 men, a large reserve, and 250,000 mobile militia, it is evident that Italy would not be in a position to send away from her own front and territory an army of 550,000 men. If Italy could spare 250,000 fresh troops for Turkey within the next month, it would be a generous contribution, and would go far to bring into line the disaffected Balkan States, whose adhesion to the cause of the Allies is the real need to bring Turkey down, and reduce both the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus.

Bonavista.—Good sign of fish yesterday with jiggers, boats secured from 1 to 2 quintals. The recent north wind did much damage to traps; more than half of them are beyond repair, and cannot go in the water again this season.
Harbor Grace.—Traps nothing, boats with hook and line secured from 2 to 5 quintals yesterday, with caplin bait.
Twillingate.—Wind W. S. W., light, fine, clear and warm; only a few traps reset since storm, these average a qtr. barrel; nothing for hook and line.

VESSELS CLEARED.—The number of vessels cleared for Labrador and the Straits up to Monday, Aug. 2nd, was 450, made up as follows: From Conception Ht. 5; Hr. Main, 2; Spaniard's Bay, 4; Hr. Grace, 21; Carbon-car, 33; Western Bay, 3; Trinity, 8; Catalina, 12; Bonavista, 15; King's Cove, 28; Greenspond, 116; Twillingate, 102; Bonne Bay, 10; Burgeo, 1; Channel, 17. The tonnage of these is 17,935, and they carry crews aggregating 5,616.

A Voice From Away North.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—Please allow me space in your columns to say a word regarding Government officials on the coast of Labrador. We have a sub-collector and tide-water at Cartwright; also, the same number of gentry at Rigolet. The Hudson Bay Co.'s stores at Cartwright has had to pay duty this year on a small package or two of stationery, and at Rigolet the collector there has collected duty on a few tins of gasoline. Now, Sir, Editor, the H. B. Co. are having no bonded goods come to either Cartwright or Rigolet this year, and I can tell you the duties on bonded goods at Cartwright and Rigolet outside the H. B. Co. are small indeed; so small, in fact, that any school boy past the fourth reader could collect them, and fix the accounts. Now let me ask Sir E. P. Morris one question. Does he call it economy to have four strong, able-bodied men in these two places, getting a good wage at the expense of the Government and doing absolutely nothing to earn it? If he calls that economy, then my ideas of economy do not agree with his. When a poor, destitute widow, or worn-out fisherman on this coast applies to the Relieving Officer for a paltry twenty dollars a year, they are more often than not sent empty away. Wouldn't it be a brighter jewel in the crown of the present Government (if it has a crown) to give the salary of these four able-bodied men to some of the widows and old worn-out fishermen of this coast, and to send these four said able-bodied men away, and let them do something to earn their daily bread as other and better men are doing? If the Government has lots of money to spend, why not spend it profitably? I hear they (the Government) have broached their nest egg already. It's my belief they'll want a whole nest full of eggs, if they go on at the rate they have been going. Don't talk economy, Sir Edward and colleagues, unless you practice it.

Give my love to all the friends, especially Aunt Judy. Tell her I wish I could get some of her beer now. I think this is all now; you must excuse this letter for I am writing it on the grass.


