SPECULATION.

Speculation is the shortest and most direct route between hope and bankruptcy. It is the easiest known method of becoming rich in the imagination and poverty-stricken in the bank book. 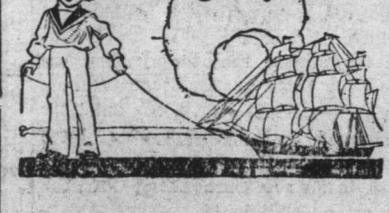

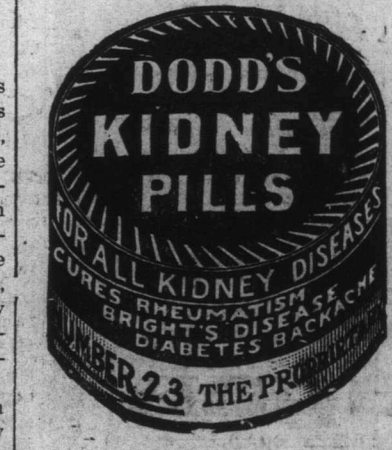
