

Lord "Bill" (as he was familiarly known) was scouting one day when he and his party were fired on of June .. . 110 111 96 100 by Zulus, ambushed in the long grass. Two of his men dropped dead at the first volley, the second un-46 horsed a sergeant, who, though not killed, was seriously injured. Without a moment's hesitation, although the Zulus (grown bold by their success), were rushing with brandished spears to dispatch the fallen man. Beresford wheeled his horse round and spurred back to his rescue. Jumping from the saddle, he told the sergeant to mount. The man refused. saving there was no need to sacrifice two lives. Firing at the oncoming Zulus, Lord Bill roared: "If you don't mount, I'll punch your head," and after him, and raced away with a ivan of Caplin Bay is now lying shower of bullets and assegais whistling past his ears. A moment's the same war which gave General Butler the cross which he won by repeated acts of the most reckless ourage. "Six lives," we are told, "he is known to have saved personally, and how many more by his orders and example, it would be difficult to tell." Thrice on one day he carried stricken men from the field, in the very face of the Zulu hordes, with their assegais raining about his head. Truly these are tales of deathless leeds. In this battle 23,000 Zulus atacked, but left 1,500 of their number lead on the field.
