A few years ago the world's records for speed was 90 miles an hour attained by ice boats on the Hudson. At 280 miles an hour, Lieut. Maitland could get around the world in less than four days.

As one goldfish will lay as high as 25,000 eggs in one season, he has no difficulty in keeping his ponds well stocked. The worthless land has thus been turned into a very profitable "goldfish mine."
