## Road Worker Turns up \$1,000 in Gold.

PICK STRIKES BOX FULL OF COINS—MAY BE PART OF BERGDOFF TREASURE.

HAGERSTOWN, Md., Aug. 25.—Leo Hauser, 38, a laborer, was working with a gang on the Brownsville-Weverton road, near here, when his pick struck a loose metal object, and a bright piece of gold—a double eagle—appeared.

With this incentive, Hauser pried his strokes vigorously and soon unearthed a tin box about the size of a large cigar box. Prying off the top, he found the box was full of gold coins, varying in denominations from \$1 to \$20. Hauser at first estimated the treasure mounted to more than \$10,000, but late to-day it was understood he admitted the box contained only about \$1,000.

The box was found in the road, not private property, so Hauser says that "findings is keepings."

Nothing is known here of reports that the war department would investigate the case, believing the gold to be part of the money. Over C. Bergdoll is said to have been in this vicinity several years ago.

## Afridis Elect Syed Basha King.

BAMBAY, August 20.—(Associated Press).—The Afridis of the Tirah have elected a king. He is Syed Basha, who on a former occasion was elevated to the kingship, but was unable to hold his power. He has greatly increased his following in the last two years and now has assumed control of the tribes.

The Afridis are Pathans. They number eight clans.

## Canadian Bar Association in Convention.

Montreal, Sept. 8.—The convention of the Canadian Bar Association from September 4 to 8 was presided over by Hon. Mr. Justice Martin, acting Chief Justice of the Superior Court and vice-president of the Association. The convention was opened with an address by Hon. L. A. Taschereau, Premier of Quebec, and replied to by Hon. Judge Morrison, of Vancouver. His Honor Sir James A. M. Aikins, K. C., Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba and president of the Association then addressed the convention. Reports and various routine items completed the morning sitting. At lunch the convention was addressed by Lord Birkhead, former Lord Chancellor of Great Britain. The afternoon session was featured by a report by E. W. LaSaur, Chairman of the administrative committee on criminal justice. In the evening, Hon. C. E. Hughes, Secretary of State of the United States addressed the convention. Finally the day closed with a Federal Government reception to Bench and Bar of the district of Montreal and to the Association.

On the second day Hon. R. B. Bennett, Calgary, presided in the morning, when reports on various legal laws were read. There was an address by Hon. Stanislas Zeballos, former Minister of Foreign Affairs and now Justice of the Argentine Republic, President of the Association of International Law, and also addresses by Judge Mowat of Toronto and his Honor H. W. Newlands, K.C., Lieutenant-Governor of Saskatchewan. The annual banquet took place in the evening and during those who gave addresses were Lord Birkhead, Hon. Chief Justice Wm. Mulock, M. LePaulle, Advocate at the Paris Court of Appeal, representing the Paris Comparative Legislation Association; Hon. R. B. Bennett, Hon. W. J. O'Brien, K. C., Halifax, and Col. W. N. Dymally, president of the New York State Bar Association.

The closing day was devoted to election of officers and addresses given by Sir Douglas Hesse, Chief Justice of New Brunswick, Martin Conway, of the New York Bar, and Hon. Sir Francis Lacombe, Chief Justice of the Court of King's Bench of Quebec.

## Our Dumb Animals.

REPORT OF CHIEF AGENT FOR WEEK ENDING AUG. 7TH.

On Sunday morning I attended the landing of 24 head of cattle from the train, saw that they were well watered and take to pasture by Mr. Halliday. Also 50 head of cattle on Monday. These were taken to Campbell and McKay's premises. There is no watering facility at the Railway Station and this makes it very inconvenient for cattle coming in by train. There is a great need of a drinking trough at the Station. I also attended to the landing of 182 head of cattle, 62 sheep and a number of pigs and poultry from the Canadian Sapper. All were in good condition, carefully handled and watered and fed after being landed. I humanely put to death two unlicensed dogs. I also sent two lame horses off the street for a rest. I received a report of a vicious dog on Circular Road. The owner intends having the animal humanely put to death. I attended a sale of cattle at Campbell and McKay's, and all were taken away immediately after sale. I also put three cats to death at the request of the owners. In future people are requested to subscribe towards the funds of the Society for having this work done. I investigated a case reported by a resident of Queen's Road of some boys cruelly treating a cat. The boys said they had picked it up after it had been run over by an automobile. I also interviewed a city business man who has purchased a new horse to replace an old one which he had had for a number of years. He promised the old one would be looked after and would not receive hard treatment, and promised he would have it humanely put to death when past its labor.

I am looking for more orders for the picture of "The Horse's Prayer." The Society is hoping that all the different school boards will see their way clear to have one placed in all the schools. Two city gentlemen sent one to Mount Cashel Orphanage and one to the C. of E. Orphanage. We would like more to follow. We would like to get some subscribers to a magazine called "Our Dumb Animals." The subscription is one dollar yearly, payable in advance. Subscriptions may be sent to me for the Society's account.

## Don'ts for Housewives.

Don't pour hot water into a cold casserole, or put the dish over a burner unless quite dry outside, and containing food or liquid inside.

Don't allow cheese to get mouldy, but wrap it in cheese-cloth wrung out of vinegar. Keep the cloth moist.

Don't forget to soak new lamp wicks in hot vinegar, and to dip into paraffin when dry before passing them through the burner.

Don't use a knife to scale fish, but a curry-comb, kept for the purpose only.

Don't cover fish when cooking it in fat, as the steam that gathers on the cover causes the fat to cool, and the fish will not be crisp.

Don't throw away old gas mantles, but use them for polishing silver. Apply with a damp cloth as you use powder.

## Hints for Housewives.

Sago, which has been soaked in water or milk until quite soft, is an excellent substitute for meat or baking powder, in the proportion of one teaspoonful of dry sago to four of flour.

Before chopping sweet meat in the oven, strain, and let it get cold. Make more easily chopped, and waste in prevented.

A suede belt can be cleaned by rubbing with a coarse flannel dipped in sawdust, and the nap can be raised afterwards by rubbing with glass paper.

A handy string holder for the kitchen can be made from a tin funnel. Put the ball of string, or twine, into the funnel, and hang up, first drawing the end from the centre of the ball through the opening at the bottom.

Tough meat can be made tender by brushing it over with one part vinegar or two parts of olive oil several hours before cooking.

## Nicaragua's Debt.

Nicaragua owes the League of Nations \$60,000 for three years' membership dues. She formerly failed to present the resignation of the matter was dropped. The League has decided to reduce the \$60,000 to \$10,000, payable at the rate of \$1,000 a year for ten years, to reduce the future annual dues to \$20,000 to \$5,000. The proposal will be submitted to Congress in October.
