CORNISHMAN AS NEW BOXING STAR

Mr. Corri impressed. In an endeavour to discover a new British boxing champion, The Daily Mirror has drawn the attention of Mr. Eugene Corri, the famous referee, to a young Cornishman.

He is a man named Richards, who recently won the county's catch-weight wrestling championship, displaying remarkable agility and quick thinking in doing so.

Mr. Corri, who refereed the Gibbons-Bloomfield fight, was greatly impressed by Richards' photograph, "He has the grim fighting face," he said, "and stands in the manner of a born scrapper."

Cornwall is the county that produced Bob Fitzsimmons, one of the greatest champions in the history of the ring. Will it again provide Britain with a boxer worthy of upholding his country's honour in international contests?

"GRIM FIGHTING FACE"

Young Wrestling Champion Who Stands Like "A Born Scrapper."

Now that Britain's latest hope to retrieve her lost prestige in the heavyweight boxing championship of the world has gone with the defeat of Jack Bloomfield by Tom Gibbons, of America, it is time to find a new champion.

But after the humiliating defeats we have suffered within the last few years our new representative (if any) must be a champion in the real sense of the word—a skilful boxer, a game fighter, and a man who combines brawn with brains.

Among those who are very anxious to discover a new man is Mr. Eugene Corri, the famous referee, who officiated at the Gibbons-Bloomfield fight at Wembley.

As Mr. Corri says, a champion is born and never made, but, nevertheless, there are probably several young men in these islands who are born champions.

Not Encouraged. Their energies are invariably diverted in other directions, and they seldom receive the encouragement necessary to their proper career.

A Daily Mirror representative who was recently in Cornwall witnessing the catch-weight wrestling championship of that county, was struck by the startling possibilities of some of the young giants who took part in it.

The most promising among them was Richards, who beat all comers. Young and supple and strong, he was one of the quickest and brainiest wrestlers on the field. Unlike other forms of wrestling, the Cornish style not only demands great strength but the finer qualities of nimbleness and quick thinking, which are among the chief attributes of the champion boxer.

When Richards' photograph was shown to Mr. Corri he was greatly impressed.

Reserve of Strength. "I have never seen a likelier young man to be a champion," he said. "He has the grim, fighting face, the beautifully balanced body suggestive of an enormous reserve of strength, and he stands in the manner of a born scrapper."

"After all, except for Ireland, Cornwall is one of the most promising places for breeding boxers."

"Bob Fitzsimmons came from there, and were it not for their passion for wrestling we should probably have had a champion from there before now."

"I should very much like the opportunity of meeting Richards. He is young and I could tell in a few minutes whether he is a possible world-beater."

FOR A.A.A. CHAMPIONSHIPS MEET.

Hurdles.

Different heights, distances and number of hurdles may be selected for hurdle races. In making a record it shall be necessary for the competitor to jump over every hurdle in its proper position, and no record shall be allowed unless all the hurdles remain standing after the competitor clears them. A competitor knocking down three or more hurdles or any portion of three or more hurdles in a race, shall be disqualified. A competitor who runs around or trails his leg or foot alongside any hurdle shall be disqualified. In the 100 yards hurdle race eight hurdles shall be used, and each hurdle shall be 2ft. 6in. high. They shall be placed ten yards apart, with the first hurdle 15 yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle 15 yards before the finishing line.

TELEGRAM ROAD RACE.

Gower Stone The First Entry. Gower Stone, winner of the C. L. D. 10 Mile Race, this year, is the first competitor to enter the "Telegram" Road Race.

Gower, who is just turning the age of seventeen years, came into prominence as a runner last year, and is now being heavily backed by his supporters in the race for the "Telegram" Cup. It was only the early part of this year that he decided to take up the long distance running, and in July last, in his first 10 mile race, from the Octagon to St. George's Field, he romped home a winner in the time of 50.27. Ever since then he has been devoting all his time to get in preparation for the forthcoming race, and he is now feeling in fine fettle and confident that he can lower his previous time by several minutes.

Stone no doubt will cause the other runners no little worry.

The second entry for the "Telegram" Road Race is that of William Linegar, who will run under the colours of the T.A. and B. Society. Linegar is one of the few runners that has rapidly advanced to the front in a very short time, and judging by his past performances both on the road and in the field, he now ranks on an even par with the local champion, O'Toole, and a most gruelling race for the honours between the two is bound to follow. Linegar resides on the Blackhead Road, is 24 years of age, and is competing in the 10 mile road race for a first time. Linegar will be a big favorite, and it would not be surprising that he will come through with flying colours. He is a great road runner with lots of stamina, and his supporters are already confident of his victory.

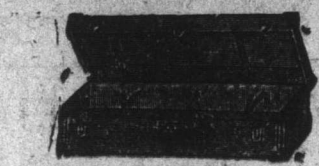

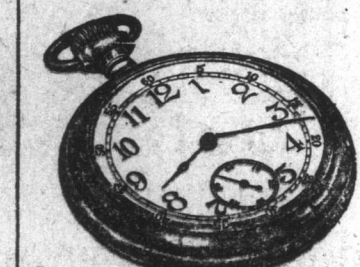
