Grand Falls Co-Operative Society, Ltd.**BUSINESS MEETING.**

The ninth half yearly meeting of the Grand Falls Co-Operative Society, Limited, was held in the Catholic School on Tuesday, the 4th inst. The Chairman, Mr. Raines, in giving a hearty welcome to all the members present, made a special reference to the large number of ladies present and which, in his opinion, augurs well for the future of our Society. Reviewing the half year's operations he stated that we had again beaten all previous records, the sales showing an increase of \$3.7 per cent. He assured the meeting that it was a source of great satisfaction to the Executive to be in a position to record an advance and to assure the members that the Society was more firmly established than ever and that if the members would only increase their share capital, a much better state of affairs would exist and our progress would become much more rapid.

During the half year under review we had made several additions to the premises, which added considerably to the business efficiency. The dry goods department in particular was one in which they felt proud and it was anticipated that the members would increase their loyalty in this department to a marked extent during the present period. The sales for the half year amounted to \$105,947.47, as against \$79,203.94 for the corresponding period of 1924, an increase of \$26,743.53. The share and loan deposits for the half year amounted to \$9,451.65, while withdrawals totalled \$2,918.05, an increase of \$6,533.60.

Membership at the beginning of the period numbered 467, since when 71 have been admitted and 25 have withdrawn, leaving the present number 513. The balance sheet was taken in detail and after various items had been explained, the Auditors' Report was read by Mr. Morgan. The latter testified to the manner in which the auditors found the books and to the correctness of the accounts submitted, after which the balance sheet was put before the meeting and carried unanimously. The net trading surplus for the half year amounted to \$7,652.50. The Executive recommended a return of 7 per cent. on purchases for the period, which was accepted by acclamation. The election of officers resulted in the two retiring members being re-elected, together with William James, Samuel Lane, Walter Fewer and William Cobb.

After other items of business had been discussed the Chairman thanked the members for their past loyalty and hoped that the current period would be one of added progress and prosperity to both Society and members, after which the meeting was declared closed.

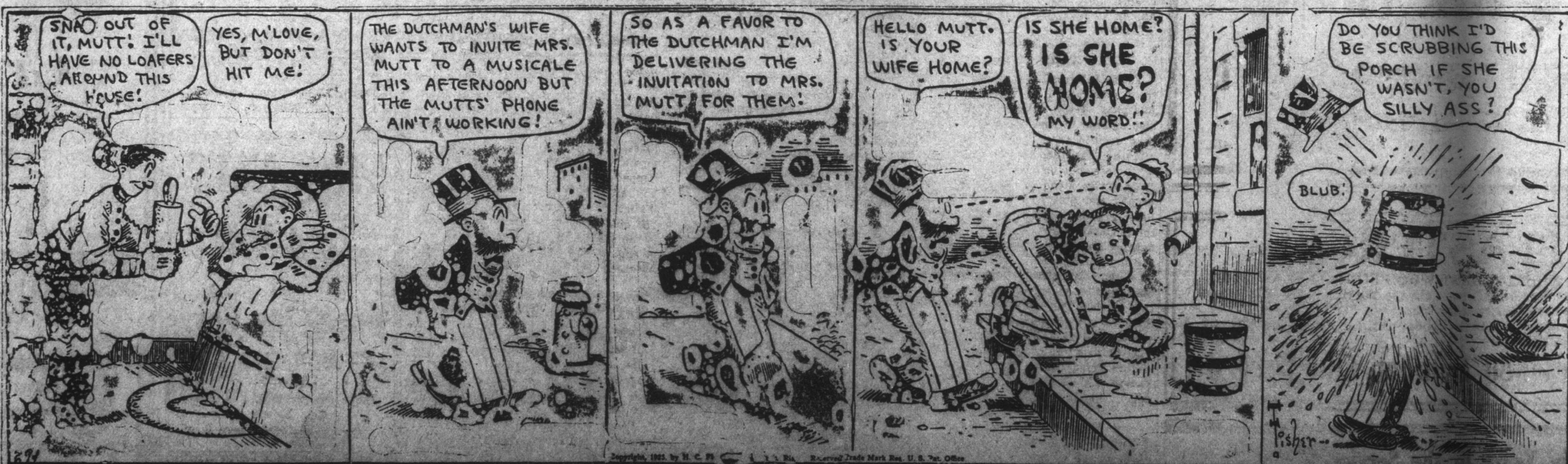

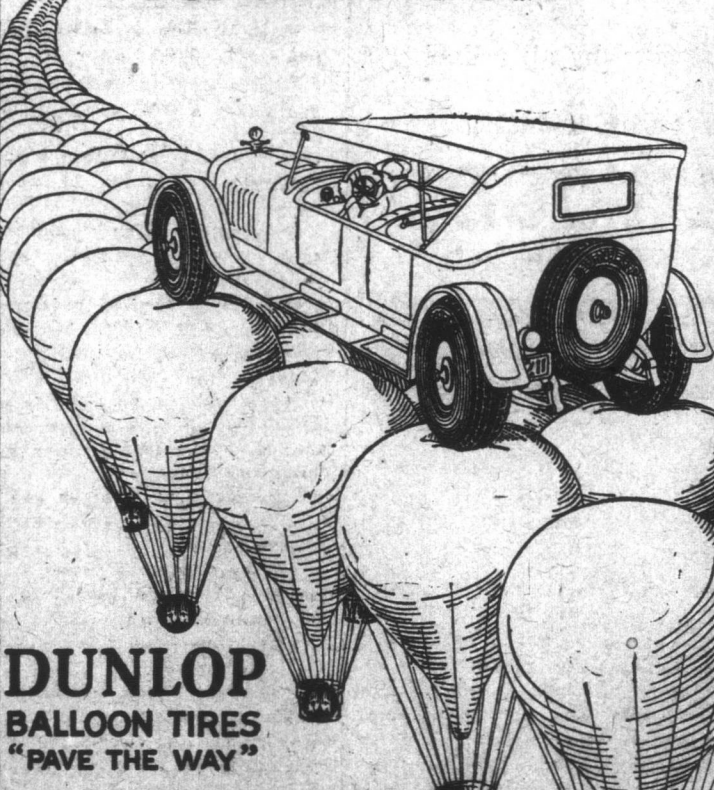
