### Imperial Federation

Hon. A. S. Malcolm, M.L.C., New Zealand, in the London Nineteenth Century: The Empire is seriously handicapped by the present want of a representative authority with executive powers. The world has always found it difficult to believe that the far-flung British Empire is a unit. When it finds that this or that Dominfon has failed to follow a lead it will be sure it is not. It is not what an Empire is, but what the world believes it to be, that counts in diplomacy. If the Empire had a representative authority its prestige would be even greater than at present. . . . The common form of objection to any form of Imperial Federation is, "Oh, we cannot part with our autonomy". . . . A little thought and discussion would possibly convince us that our autonomy was in no way threatend by Imperial Federation. Under that we could keep all the autonomy we enjoy at present-that is, the unlimited right to manage our local affairs. Imperial Federation would increase our powers, not diminish them. For at present the Dominions have no powers in regard to foreign affairs. We are "consulted," but we have no "authority." Under Imperial Federation our representatives would be members of the body that would control foreign affairs. There would appear then to be no ground whatever, for fearing
