

Immigration to Canada.

We are glad to learn that the Ontario Government are adopting vigorous measures for attracting a large immigration to this Province next season.

Such vigorous measures are not only wise but necessary. If we are to secure our fair share of immigrants we must not only tell them of the advantages Ontario offers as a field for their energy and effort, but must induce them to come to our shores by every reasonable encouragement and assistance.

Editorial Items. Kaiser Wilhelm has agreed to cooperate with England for the suppression of the slave trade on the east coast of Africa, and has instructed his consuls in Africa and Zanzibar to place their means at the disposal of the expedition now fitting out in England for that purpose.

The County Prohibitory Society of Lennox and Addington have obtained an opinion from Mr. R. A. Harrison that the passing of what is called the "Wood's Act" by the Ontario Legislature does not interfere with the adoption of County prohibitory by-law under the provisions of the well-known Dunkin Act.

The "Auld Kirk" in Hamilton. We copy from the Hamilton correspondence of the Toronto Mail, the following item:—

"A little over a year ago the minister of St. Andrew's Church, (Kirk of Scotland,) was ejected from the building by the Sheriff, through the power conveyed to him in an undefended writ of ejectment. The parties ejected took with them several books and other movable property, including the melodeon and benches used in the Sabbath School, and the Sheriff, I believe, closed the door and gave possession to the parties holding the claim. On October 22nd, 1871, six days after the ejection, the Rev. Mr. Burnett commenced preaching in St. James's Hall, and has since regularly preached there to the congregation that went out with him from the old church. I must, by the way, call it the old church to distinguish it from the new one, though it is not an old church by any means, being a stone building put up only about twenty years ago. The spire is generally allowed to be the finest in Canada, and is one of the most conspicuous objects in any view of the city. The old church, then, remained closed for almost a year, until the first of September last, when it was reopened for public worship. Some time before a memorial, praying for the constitution or recognition of a second congregation, had been presented to the Presbytery, and that body, by a majority of votes, decided to take action in favor of the memorialists. From 1st September forward the pulpit has been occupied Sabbath after Sabbath by various ministers, among them the Rev. Kenneth McLennan, of Fort Hope; the Rev. Mr. MacRae, of Hopewell, Nova Scotia; Rev. Mr. Pierson, of Detroit, and others. Meantime Mr. Burnett and his friends have not been idle, and are building a new church on Hayter and Park streets, facing the north-west corner of the Central School Grounds. The greater part of the cost of it, a little under \$6,000, has been subscribed and paid in, several Hamilton people not belonging to the "Kirk" having given handsome donations, and contributions having been received from other places, among the rest \$60 from the "Kirk" congregation in Fergus. The roof is now being put on, and it is expected that the new church will be opened on New Year's day or shortly after. Rev. Mr. Burnett, we understand, holds that he is the minister of St. Andrew's church; that the congregation to which he regularly ministers, is the congregation of St. Andrew's, and that the legal accident of dispossession by writ of ejectment cannot alter clerical and congregational standing. On the other hand it is certain that the old church was St. Andrew's in time past, and the question arises, when, and by virtue of what act or deed did it cease to be such? Mr. Burnett and his congregation have asserted their claim in the most conspicuous manner by setting in mortar, in the

front wall of their church, the name of "St. Andrew's" carved in stone. The city papers in their announcement of Divine services every Saturday, apply the name of St. Andrew's Church to the old one, and this seems to answer well enough now; but how will it be when the new church is also opened, and when it demands recognition as "St. Andrew's"? Mr. Burnett, it should be added, holds possession of the manse or parsonage, and must continue to hold it as the minister of St. Andrew's congregation. It is to be hoped that the learned men of the Kirk Synod will be able to decide without the intermeddling of these of another profession, who wear the black gown sometimes, this question as to the name. Whatever occasion for regret there may appear in all this, it seems now to be assumed that the "Auld Kirk" of Scotland will have two congregations in Hamilton instead of only one, as formerly, and so the main result promises to be a good one, after all."
