NOTICE is hereby given that the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Aylmer, in the County of Elgin, will petition the Legislature of the Province of Ontario at its coming session, to pass an Act giving the Corporation authority to issue debentures for the sum of \$11,803.85 for the purpose of paying the floating indebtedness of the Corporation, such sum being made up by expenditures over and above the debentures issued for the following purposes and for the payment of three debentures issued under By-law 623 re Aylmer Iron Works Co., 639 re C. M. St. Clair loan on Pork Factory, and for which no provision was made in the rates collected in the years 1907, 1908, and 1909, and 1910 respectively.

The existing Debenture debt of the Town of Aylmer (exclusive of local improvement debentures) is \$112,500.37, of which no part of the principal or interest is in arrear.

The above indebtedness was incurred by reason of the Aylmer Iron Works Company, Limited, and C. M. St. Clair each failing to meet the instalments payable under the Mortgage taken as security for the loan made to each and each subsequently becoming insolvent. The cost of the addition to the Town Hall and improvements exceeded the estimate and debentures issued by the amount above mentioned. Damages and law costs were incurred as above stated.

The said Debentures, and other expenditures, were paid from moneys that should have been used for current expenses, thus increasing the floating debt to the above amount and to liquidate this floating debt at once and in addition thereto pay the ordinary annual expenses of the Municipality
