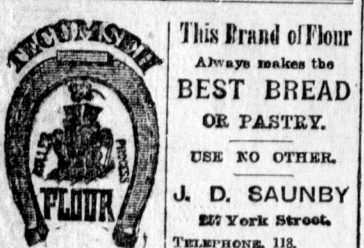

THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 24-11 p.m.—The depression which covered Manitoba and the Western States last night is now situated over Lake Superior and the pressure is high over the middle Atlantic coast and the Pacific States. Rain has fallen generally in Manitoba and over the Gulf of St. Lawrence; elsewhere the weather has been fine.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 30°-58°; Qu'Appelle, 31°-62°; Winnipeg, 34°-64°; Toronto, 50°-57°; Montreal, 58°-80°; Quebec, 50°-70°; Halifax, 40°-62°.

Local temperatures—Highest, 54°; lowest, 61°.

—John Mack, charged with larceny, was committed to the city jail yesterday.

A Prosperous Career.

The past year has been one of grace and blessing to Oddfellows. The number initiated last year, the report reads, was 68,000. Pleasant Relations.

Mr. B. J. Troop, local agent of the Bell Telephone Company, will a few days leave for Hamilton to assume a corresponding position there. Yesterday morning Mr. Troop was summoned upstairs to the operating room, where he was puzzled to find his complete staff of assistants assembled evidently with "malice aforethought." "They Will Be Done" at Ottawa.

Rev. M. P. Talling, of James' Presbyterian Church, preached last Sabbath morning from the text, Matt. vi., 10: "They Will Be Done." Referring to Ottawa, he said: "When we pray, 'They will be done on earth,' that means, 'They will be done at Ottawa. If God's will were executed at the capital there would be a repetition of history. He who is crowned with knotted cords the money changers from the temple, would drive with a scourge of a different kind the money ex-changers from that temple of our Dominion, and proclaim aloud, 'This House is sacred for other uses, but ye have made it a den of thieves.' But if God's will is to be done at Ottawa, it must first be done in London and Hamilton and throughout all the Provinces. When next election comes, and a million voters bend each over his ballot, let the Christian franchise pray, 'They will be done on this ballot.' Then the vote for the best man, regardless of party lines, and the complexion of the House will be changed. When God's will is done in voting the House will be purified; and there are Christians enough in the Dominion to do it if men will be Christians first and Grits or Tories second. While we have representative government we must have party government; but upright voting would put the balance of power into the hands of men superior to party weakness.
