## A Good old Man

Was the Author of "Tom Brown's School Days."

Sketch of Kis Career—He Wrote the Most Celebrated Book of Its Kind.

London, March 25,-"Tom" Hughes the author of "Tom Brown's School Days," who died at Brighton Sunday, was one of those charming men who never forget that they have been schoolboys. He was a schoolboy in his old age-he was born nearly years ago-and up to the time of his death delighted in the society of schoolboys, and made schoolboys delight in his company. He could be stern, and often was so, but he al-ways remembered that he had been a boy himself, and his great sympathy with the joys and sorrows of the schoolboy found expression in that classic, "Tom Brown's School Days." When young Hughes went to Rugby, Dr. Arnold, father of the late Matthew Arnold, was its head master. It was Dr. Arnold who made Rugby the famous school it became. It was "Tom" Hughes who told the public what manner of school it was. Arnold and Hughes together placed Rugby side by side with Eton, Harrow and Winchester. "Tora Brown's School Days" had a great influence in the United States, and helped to cultivate a chivalrous spirit among American boys toward one another, and a feeling of affection toward the school in which they were being educated. The book was translated into French and German, and had a good effect in France and Germany by arousing an interest among

boys in out-of-doors sport. When "Tom Brown" left Rugby he went to Oriol College, Oxford. His "Tom Brown at Oxford" did not have the success of its Rugby predecessor. He was graduated in 1845, and was at Oxford during the celebrated Tractarian movement, when Oxford had men who have been since placed in

the world's Pantheon. Mr. Hughes studied equity, "ate his dinners" at Lincoln's Inn and was called to the equity bar in 1848. He went o Parliament, but made no name as a debater. The public had accepted him as the one who could write "Tom Brown's School Days"-which was published in 1857—and would give him no credit for anything else.

Mr. Hughes, who was made a judge in 1882, became imbued with the idea that a co-operative colony of Englishmen in Ameica would be a success. The colony was formally opened on Oct. 5, 1880, in Tennessee, and was known as the Rugby colony. The colonists were principally young Englishmen of birth, who could play lawn tennis well, and had been brought up to a B. and S. three or four times a day. The colony was a failure, and Mr. Hughes, who was the most unpractically honest man that ever lived, could never understand the reason of its

failure Socially, Mr. Hughes was a great favorite.

THE FUNERAL. London, March 25.—The remains of Mr. Thos. Hughes, Q.C., author of "Tom Brown's School Days," etc., were interred today in the presence of a cround of friends and admirers. In accordance with the desire of the deceased, the funeral ceremony was of the simplest kind. The grave was lined with ivy, and there were many floral
