TORONTO, May 25—11 p.m.—The de-
pression mentioned last night as being
over the western portion of the lake region
has since moved rapidly to the Gulf of St.
Lawrence, and there is now another over
Kansas, moving east. The pressure is
about average over the lake region and
Northwest Territories. The weather to-
day has been showery in the St. Lawrence
Valley and fine in other parts of the Do-
minion. Minimum and maximum temper-
atures: Calgary, 34°—60°; Edmonton, 40°
—62°; Prince Albert, 26°—70°; Qu'Appelle,
34°—64°; Winnipeg, 28°—64°; Toronto,
42°—61°; Montreal, 46°—68°; Quebec, 40°
—58°; Halifax, 44°—66°.

TORONTO, May 26—1 a.m.—Probabili-
ties for the next 24 hours for the lower
lake region (covering the peninsula and
as far east as Belleville) are: Wind
mostly easterly; fair, with higher tem-
perature at most points.

Save His Brother and Sister.

BUFFALO, May 25.—Burglars attempted
to gain entrance to the residence of John
Downey, on Ganson street, early on Sun-
day morning. A dog in the house became
frightened, and, jumping upon a table,
upset a lighted lamp, which set fire to the
house. A policeman discovered the
flames, and a sister Mr. and Mrs. Downey
and John Downey, aged 7, one of their
three children, to escape. They were all
half suffocated by smoke. The boy ran
back to rescue his sister Annie, aged 5, but
never came alive. When the firemen had
subdued the flames the horribly burned
bodies of the three children were found in
the ruins and taken to the morgue. The
dog's skeleton was found in the arms of
little Frank.

Doubtful Wanderers.

The Presbyterian Council of London,
Ont., passed the following resolution at a
recent meeting:

"That it is the sense of this Presbyterian
Council, composed of the ministers and
elders of the various Presbyterian congre-
gations of the city, that much care should
be exercised in regard to giving counten-
ance or announcements to itinerant speak-
ers on religious or quasi-religious subjects,
unless they come with a clear record and
unimpeachable credentials."

"Much care" should be exercised even
when they have a "clear record" and "un-
impeachable credentials." It does not by
any means follow that the Presbyterian
pulpit should be used for advertising
"itinerant speakers" because they may
happen to be fairly clean. The pulpit is
not a bulletin board for the use of dead-
head advertisers. There is plenty of print-
ers' ink in London and every other place to
advertise every itinerant willing to pay his

Heath-Schmidt.

Stratford Herald: At the residence of
Mr. J. H. Schmidt, editor of the Colonist,

Canadian Women in Literature.

At the great press convention at the
World's Fair, Chicago, two papers were
contributed by former London women—
Miss Eva H. Brodlique and Miss Ethelwyn
Wetherald. Miss Brodlique has been con-
nected with the ADVANCE, and Miss
Wetherald is associate editor of the popular
monthly "Wives and Daughters." The Chi-
cago Herald reports thus: The next
paper was on "Canadian Women in Art and
Literature," prepared by Miss Ethelwyn
Wetherald, of Canada. It was read by
Miss Eva Brodlique, of Chicago. The
writer deplored that there had been little
done by women artists and authors in Can-
ada. This was owing to the same lack of
independence which kept Canada in the
background on the list of nations. There
are artists among Canadian women whom
their country will some day be proud to
honor, but they are of recent growth. As
to writers, some Canadian women are doing
excellent work, but the trouble is they
have to struggle against conditions pro-
duced by the political dependence of their
country and the political dependence of
their sex.

Miss Brodlique then read a paper of her
own on "Canadian Women in Journalism."

She said there had not been approximately
the same influx of women into the ranks of
Canadian journalists that is one of the
satisfactory phases of American journalism.

There are several good reasons for this.
The Sunday paper, that receptacle for varied
manuscripts, is not a Canadian paper.
There was no Sunday paper, on the con-
trary public opinion being strenuously
opposed to it. The lack of Sunday papers
meant a lack of opportunities for many
women writers. Then there was a spirit of
old-fashionedism among the Canadian
newspaper men who were against the
employment of women. But the tone and
temper of the Canadian press was improv-
ing in this respect and the outlook was
encouraging. Miss Brodlique told of the
labors and abilities of a number of women
journalists and ended with the statement
that the Mecca of the Canadian newspaper
women was in the United States.
