LOUBET'S ENGLISH VISIT

French President to Visit King Edward During July.

Paris, May 28.—It was officially announced yesterday that President Loubet will proceed to London about July 20, to return the visit of King Edward, and that he will stay there three or four days.

A TURKISH SUCCESS

The Sultan's Troops Route Several Insurgent Bands.

Salonica, May 28.—In an encounter between Turks and Bulgarians, May 26, in the forest near Smerdesch, south of Lake Presba (where on May 21 150 insurgents were killed after a fight lasting 30 hours), seventeen Bulgarians and three Turks were killed.

At Plosaka the Bulgarians destroyed a Turkish tower with dynamite, after which a detachment of Turkish troops arrived on the scene and routed the insurgents, killing four of them.

FRANCE AND WHEAT

Chamber of Deputies Decide to Keep Up the Duty.

Paris, May 28.—In the Chamber of Deputies Tuesday, after a brief discussion, the bill reducing the duty on wheat to five francs was defeated by a majority of 301 votes.

The minister of agriculture, M. Mougeot, in opposing the measure, stated that the present price of wheat was not excessive, and that the farmers were receiving a lower price than was regarded as legitimate. He stated that the proposed reduction of duty would not produce the desired end of cheaper bread, as it would not affect the price of flour.

The remedy, if bread was too dear, continued the minister, was for the municipalities to exercise their power to fix an official price of bread.

FLOUR STANDARDS

The Board Abolished Last Year Has Been Re-established.

Montreal, May 28.—An order-in-council has been issued re-establishing the flour standard board, which was abolished last year. The board will meet in Montreal before June 15 to select standard samples of flour. The members are: Messrs. H. W. Raphael, Montreal, chairman; A. E. Gagnon, Montreal; Wm. Brodie, Quebec; J. L. Spink, Toronto; Wm. G. Bailey, Hamilton; Robert Noble, of the Dominion Flour Association, and Mr. Hadral, secretary of the Montreal Board of Trade, acting as secretary.

This is the result of an agitation commenced by the Corn Exchange Association last December, when a resolution was adopted urging the non-renewal of the system of selecting standards, which had been in operation over 40 years. The efforts were renewed by deputation on Feb. 11, and the representations then made to the Minister of Trade and Commerce have resulted in the passage of the order-in-council.

THE COMMITTEE AND THE "CAP"

Col. Matheson Makes a Broad Hint as to the Source of the Gamey Money.

Toronto, May 28.—"I know that Sullivan has been said to complain very bitterly about his own friends at not getting this money, and that it was taken from him by members of the Government, and part of it was the money given to Mr. Gamey."

Such were the words used by Col. Matheson this morning at the meeting of the public accounts committee of the Legislature, where the Shannon timber deal was being further discussed, the evidence so far going to show that Sullivan's profit was \$8,750.

In reply to Col. Matheson's bold charge, Mr. Latchford replied: "Mr. Matheson should be more specific or not make the statement at all."

"You get your back manager here and I will show you," retorted Col. Matheson.

"He will be here; he was only summoned by me," said Mr. Latchford.

"You are fighting for time in the dying days of the session," said Col. Matheson.

"I do not think there is any disposition on the part of the manager to delay or defer action at all."

This cross-firing was precipitated by an announcement made by the chairman that Mr. Wood had sent word that he wished to consult his solicitor before producing Sullivan's papers, which had been asked for, he had had no opportunity of doing so yesterday.

The objection to meeting tomorrow was stated to be that several other committees wanted to sit tomorrow. Mr. Davis said that after Tuesday all the time necessary would be given to this matter. He also declared that Col. Matheson's charge was most unfair, as every effort had been made to get the witnesses here. There was nothing to conceal, and he repudiated most emphatically the insinuations made by Col. Matheson. He had never discussed timber or politics with Capt. Sullivan.

The messengers who went to Buffalo in search of "Cap" Sullivan were the only witnesses examined by the committee today. J. E. Robertson said that he had gone to all the hotels in Buffalo, but had found no trace of the man. He didn't know whether he had been in Carter's Hotel in Niagara street or not.

D. Miller, who had gone to St. Catharines and Port Dalhousie, said that the only trace of the man was that "Cap" was that he had left some time previous on a tug.

The committee adjourned till Tuesday.

TO DROP PARTY LINES

Mr. G. F. Harter Advises Prohibitionists to Stand Together.

Toronto, May 28.—Yesterday morning about 200 delegates attended the opening session of the annual convention of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance, held in the hall of the Young Women's Guild building, McGill street. President McKay is ill, and Mr. G. F. Harter was appointed chairman. The first business was the reading of a letter held in the pavilion and was adjourned at 11:30 to allow the committees to get to work. There was little difference of opinion, and the resolutions and memorials presented very few.

Mr. Harter's address was first on the list. Mr. Harter advocated that party lines be dropped at once. He urged singleness of purpose, too much time, he said, had already been spent in trifling with petty politics. This was not to the credit of temperance workers or for the good of the cause. Mr. Harter reviewed in brief the attitude of the hotelmen of the province. There was a single aim. He would not waste time in fault-finding with the Legislature. He would blame no party, but he would blame the Government as a whole. The temperance party was at present without friends in the House. If these friends were there, they were friends afraid to speak out.

The report of Mr. R. J. Fleming, the treasurer, was presented. It seems that Toronto gave \$2,293 towards helping temperance in the recent referendum fight. The rest of the province gave \$2,515. The total received during the year was \$7,000, and the money affairs of the alliance are in better shape than they were last year, the overdraft being very small.

Mr. J. S. Robertson presented the annual report of the alliance, which was read with the referendum campaign and the presentation of 1,346 petitions to the Government.

At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon Mr. F. S. Spence was presented by his fellow-workers with a purse containing \$1,000 and an address read by Mr. Emerson Coatsworth, in recognition of his faithful work in the cause of temperance.

A DIVORCE MIX-UP

Complicated Matrimonial Affair in English High Society.

London, May 28.—Lady Margaret Cowell-Stepney, daughter of Lord De Tabley, has petitioned for a judicial separation on the ground of the desertion of her husband, Sir Arthur Cowell-Stepney, baronet, a former member of parliament, and a very wealthy landed proprietor of Wales. He is now in Boise City, Idaho, where he recently became an American citizen and renounced his baronetcy. Lady Cowell-Stepney and her daughter testified to Sir Arthur's desertion. It appears that shortly after the daughter was born, in 1876, Sir Arthur left home and never returned. In March of this year he obtained a divorce in the courts of Idaho, on the ground of desertion.

Without touching on the validity of the Idaho divorce Justice Jeune granted a judicial separation.

Geraldine Is Free.

London, May 28.—Geraldine Umar, an actress, has been granted a divorce from her husband, Ivan Caryll, musical director of the Gaiety Theater, on the ground of the latter's misconduct. The suit was not defended.

Plenty of Farm Laborers.

Toronto, May 28.—The present indications are that this year the On-the-hill requires for harvest operations, which is the time of his greatest need in that regard. Mr. Thomas Southworth, director of colonization, said yesterday that the difficulty now impending was that the bureau was not sure of being able to find vacancies for all the immigrants.

Port Colborne, Ont., May 28.—A small two-spurred yacht, with sails set, foundered outside of the breakwater yesterday. The yacht is supposed to be the Emma Dietrich, of Cleveland, and recently bought by a Mr. Pettitt, of Lockport, N. Y., who has been here for a few days awaiting its arrival. Two boys, aged 17 years, one a son of Mr. Pettitt, and his friend, a lad named Bayless were bringing the yacht from Cleveland to Lockport. It is thought during the night's squall the boys in trying to make this harbor met their fate in the dark.
