RIGHTS OF EMPLOYEES

Engaged on the Canadian Railways.

Mr. Hugh Guthrie's Scheme for Safeguarding Them.

Interesting Debate Re the Placing of Government Buildings in Different Constituencies.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Ottawa, March 4.—The house again went into committee of supply this afternoon, but before taking up the estimates of the minister of public works, Mr. Hugh Guthrie, of Guelph, introduced a bill, in the success of which the railway men of London, in common with those of the Dominion in general, will be deeply interested. It is an act to amend the railway act, and will chiefly affect the employees of the Grand Trunk Railway Company.

Mr. Guthrie's explanation of the purpose of the amendment included a detailed account of some SPECIAL LEGISLATION which, from time to time, since the early 70's, has been secured by this company, placing it in the courts upon a basis different to that of other Canadian lines. It has secured privileges in regard to the treatment of its employees which are not enjoyed by rival roads, and it is to offset the effect of these that the Guthrie amendment is urged. The Grand Trunk has secured the right to establish a superannuation society and subsequently an insurance society, which have since become one, and must be joined by every individual who enters the company's employ. Under the rules of the Grand Trunk Railway Insurance and Provident Society, every employee of the road must relinquish his right to damages in case of accident, and his relatives have no claim upon the company in the event of his death even though it be caused by an accident or the negligence of servants of the company. All that the company allows is A SMALL COMPENSATION.

In the way of weekly payments to the injured and gratuity to the survivors of the dead, and these, Mr. Guthrie said, do not compare with the sums granted by other fraternal or insurance companies. He believed that the courts would not allow such powers to the G. T. R. under the legislation that it has secured, but the ordinary interested person could not go, had declared that an individual is absolutely precluded from getting damages when he has entered the company's employ. The adoption of Mr. Guthrie's amendment means that the power of all companies shall be limited, so that employees who meet with accidents may be in a position to secure adequate damages.

TWO MINISTERS CONTRASTED. Just as Hon. J. L. Tarte, the anti-theist of Hon. James Sutherland in his manner of conducting his business in the house, so the debates upon the votes in their estimates differed radically. The minister of marine and fisheries is never ruffled, always calm, terse seems to be imparted to the contemptible, collected and calm. Mr. Richard Cartwright took a part in the cross-firing. The opposition pressed the minister of public works for a statement of policy regarding his department. His answer was that work would be done where it was most needed. The charge was then made that some of the works projected were less needed than others. Sir Richard Cartwright was engaged for practically the first time this session. MR. CLANCY. Mr. Clancy instanced his riding as one to which the minister might well direct his attention. He intimated that it was passed over because its representative was not a supporter of the government.

MR. TARTE. Mr. Tarte replied that when Hon. David Mills represented that riding, the Conservative Government had passed it by, as it usually did if a riding sent a Liberal member to Ottawa.

SIR RICHARD CARTWRIGHT. This remark was amplified by Sir Richard Cartwright, who told of the treatment that riding of Oxford had received at Conservative hands. He said that for 40 years Woodstock and Ingersoll were neglected, while Cayuga, a place of 150 families, but in a Conservative riding, got public buildings. He said that this showed the difference between Conservative practice and the present Conservative practice, and was a fair sample of the principle followed by the late government.

A NATURAL COURSE. Hon. Mr. Tarte acknowledged that the advice of private members on the government side had more weight with the government than that of the members of the opposition, and rightly so, he argued, since they represented the bulk of the public opinion of the country. The government must, to a certain extent, be guided by its supporters.

THE OPPOSITION LEADER. This Mr. Borden took to be an enunciation of the policy, "To the victors belong the spoils," which he assailed as an iniquitous system, even while admitting that it was the system followed by the Conservatives when in power. But he said the question was not what the Conservatives had done in the past, but what should be done today.

TIME FOR A CHANGE. Sir Richard Cartwright agreed with Mr. Borden's opinion that the public moneys should be distributed according to the public needs, but he said further that the Liberal ridings had been systematically and deliberately treated with injustice by the late government, and now that the Liberals are in power it was their first duty to rectify this long-standing wrong. He said that there was a remarkable difference in the Conservatives followed by those suggested by them, "now that they are in the position in which they are likely to continue."
