THE WAR SITUATION.

There is a shower of conflicting dispatches as to the two attacks on Port Arthur by the Japanese fleet. The Russians claim to have prevented the "bottling" of the harbor, and say they gave the Japs a terrific hammering. The Mikado's fleet tells of putting one torpede boat out of business, and claim to have withdrawn their squadron undamaged. Apparently the Japs are attempting to land troops under cover of I these attacks. Reports from Northern Korea indicate that the Japanese are ready to launch themselves at the enemy on the front and flanks and clear the road to Manchuria. The Russian army on the Yalu is not as strong as the Japanese, and is hundreds of miles from reinforcements. The rumored landing of Jap troops close to Vladivostock has not been verified. As the Russian squadron from this port is supposed to be at sea, it seems improbable the Japs would attempt transportation of troops.
