Hamilton Tigers Have the Championship in Their Mit

Defeat Toronto Easily in First Home and Home Game—Score 34 to 0.

Toronto, Nov. 19.—The Hamilton Tigers and the Toronto team met Saturday afternoon on the Varsity athletic field, in the first of the home-and-home games to decide the senior O. R. F. U. championship.

The weather was perfect for football, there being hardly a breath of wind. And there was a large crowd present. Hamilton came over in large numbers, about 200 in all, and their big yellow chrysanthemums were much in evidence and added a delightful bit of color to the scene. The Hamilton people are very enthusiastic over their team, and well they might be. A better or more balanced team can scarcely be found. All the Tigers played well; it would be difficult to individualize. The Tigers should put up a great fight for the Dominion championship. Two pipers of the Ninety-first Highlanders—Hamilton's new kiltie regiment—ac-

companied the team to Toronto, and during the game dispersed sweet, harmonious sounds, as they paraded the running track at the field.

The result of the game means practically that Hamilton has the senior championship. The Toronto team hardly beat Hamilton at home next Saturday. It alone overcome a lead of 24 points.

The Toronto, on the whole, were outclassed. They were worn down by the superior weight and staying power of the visitors. At the half the score stood Hamilton 34 to Toronto 0, and the final result was 34 to 0.

The Hamilton combination was perfect, and the whole team worked as one man. The Toronto team play was rendered impossible owing to the close checking of the Hamilton players. The contest for the Dominion championship has been narrowed down to three teams. The Tigers are almost certain to win the O. R. F. U. championship. Queen's are intercollegiate champions, while the Ontario team is the champion of the Ontario and Ottawa will likely meet Nov. 26.

No senior championship will come to Toronto this year.

PROVIDENCE WANTS PATSY DONOVAN

Offered \$5,000 a Year to Manage the Grays—Will Accept If He Can Get Release.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 19.—To Patsy Donovan, former manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, and now leader of the Washington team of the American League, has been offered the management of the Providence Club of the Eastern League at a salary of \$5,000 a year.

Donovan now has the matter under consideration, and if he can secure his release from the Washington team, the chances are he will accept Powers' offer.

President Powers, of the Eastern League, who is stockholder in the Providence Club, is determined to secure a capable manager for the Rhode Island team.

As soon as he learned there was a possible chance to secure Donovan he opened negotiations with Patsy, and the pair are now dickering. Donovan is now stopping at the West End Hotel. He refused to make any statement regarding his proposed connection with the Providence.

He practically admitted, however, that he has been approached on the matter, and the chances are that if he can secure his release from Washington he will be at the head of the Providence team next season.

Donovan has expressed his dissatisfaction at conditions in Washington more than once this season. Every thing in the Senate camp is not satisfactory, and many feel the restraint placed upon him.

Donovan has also often expressed his desire to become a magnate in a minor league. If he secured the management of the Providence Club and made good he would very likely be in a position to attain his ambition to become a minor league magnate.

As manager of the St. Louis Cardinals in 1903 Donovan received one of the largest salaries ever paid to a baseball player. For that one season he got \$5,500. Strife in the ranks of the Cardinals caused Donovan to resign his position as manager at the close of the season of 1903.

KINGSTON TEAMS DO VERY WELL; TAKE TWO I. C. CHAMPIONSHIPS

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—Queen's today won the Intercollegiate Rugby Union championship from McGill by shutting out the Montreal collegians, 6 to 0. It was very spectacular, open play throughout, and pleased the couple of thousand people present. The score is not a fair indication of the closeness of the play, although Queen's deserved the victory. The game was a very hard fought and vigorous following up. Play had only started a few minutes, when Williams, Queen's center half, dropped a beautiful goal from the field, 20 yards out. Shortly after half-time Queen's forced McGill to rouse, and it turned out to be the final score of the game. The exhibition of punting, running and general open work in the second half was superb, both back divisions showing up to advantage, though that of Queen's had the better protection from its wing line. Queen's halves were all good, while Zimmerman and Tremblaine did the bulk of McGill's work. There was little difference on the line, but Queen's had whatever advantage there was going.

BRITISH COLLIERIES WITH RUSSIANS

Great Britain Innocently Assists the Enemy of Her Ally.

London, Nov. 21.—There is no serious friction, from an official point of view, between Great Britain and Japan, on account of the coaling of Russia, which has been the subject of much discussion in the British press.

At the time of the Russo-Japanese war, Japan was in a position to supply the second Pacific squadron with coal, and that France, Spain and Great Britain have permitted these colliers to put into ports to await the arrival of Vice-Admiral Rojdestvensky's vessels.

Baron Hayashi, the Japanese minister here, said that the subject had not been mentioned by the allies. However, there is doubtless a feeling of soreness on the part of Japan that British colliers are allowed to be chartered to supply the Russian fleet.

JAPS FIRED ON HOSPITAL SHIPS

Russia Charges Violation of Red Cross Rules by Besiegers of Port Arthur.

Chefoo, Nov. 20.—Gen. Balashoff, at the head of the Red Cross Society at Port Arthur, sent to the Associated Press on the torpedo destroyer Rastvoroff, which arrived here from Port Arthur on Nov. 16, and which was subsequently destroyed by her crew in this harbor, a personal letter, charging the Japanese with a violation of the rules of civilized warfare. Owing to an error the letter of Gen. Balashoff was not delivered to the Associated Press until today.

In his letter Gen. Balashoff requests the publication of the charges that the Japanese deliberately disregarded the obligations of the Geneva and Red Cross conventions. He says that they have compelled the abandonment by the Russians of the hospital ships, and that the wounded who were aboard the half-sunken steamer Andara also had to be removed. not interfere with the Japanese fleet against the Russian warships.
