BISHOP'S PASTORAL

Will Be Read in Anglican Churches on Sunday.

His Lordship Bishop Williams has issued the following pastoral to be read in all the Anglian churches in the diocess on Sunday next:

To the clergy and laity of the Diocese of Huron-In accordance with the custom of the church in this diocese for many years, you are asked to give your offering on Good Friday lowards the conversion of God's ancient people to the Christian faith. The rejection of the Jews is a great mystery. We can see the necessity of It at the time, but it is difficult to understand the continuance of it. Yet. · the fact is that they still remain outside the spiritual commonwealth of which their own was a type, and to which is prepared the way. We can see how it all happened. But it is not our part to blame. Nay, we may, if we are honest, discover in ourselves the roots of the sins which led to the tragedy of Good Friday. The blindness, the passions, the selfishness which actuated the Jews, we may surely recognize in ourselves. We are there. Christ died because of our sin. Therefore do not let us blame the

Jews. "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone" at them. Through God's goodness we have been brought to safety. Our duty ie not to blame them, or to congratulate ourselves on our superiority, but to do what we can towards the enlightenment and conversion of these people, to whom, under God, we owe so much.

There are two societies in the church working for the conversion of the Jews-"The London Society for Promoting Christianity Among the Jews," which works in Europe, Asia. Africa and elsewhere, and "The Jerusalem and the East Mission," whose title explains the scope of its work You may give your offerings to either If undesignated, they will be sent to the former society. Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is that they may be aved. Believe me, yours in Christ. DAVID HURON.
