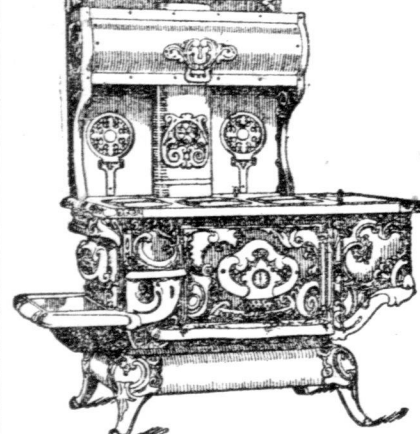

A Big Lizard.

The fossil head of a large lizard, which when alive was probably eight to twelve feet long, has been added by Dr. Woolverton to his already extensive geological collection. The head itself is about 18 inches long, and the eyes and ears are plainly visible. The head is very long and flat, and the fossil was found by a farmer living near Ingersoll, and for a long time around in his barn. Mr. Taylor, of this city, saw it, and soon afterwards it was added to Dr. Woolverton's collection.

DEATH OF MRS. R. C. BROWN

A Daughter of Color-Sergt. John Joell of the Royal Canadian Rifles.

Mrs. Catherine C. Brown, wife of R. C. Brown, died at the family residence, on Maple street, Sept. 19, and was buried in St. Peter's Cemetery on Wednesday morning, Sept. 22. The funeral mass was celebrated at St. Peter's Cathedral by Rev. Father O'Neill. Mrs. Brown was a native of Toronto, born June 3, 1850, a daughter of John and Catherine (Deigan) Joell, natives of Ireland. Her father was a non-commissioned officer in the Royal Canadian Rifles, and came to London with his regiment in July, 1861. He retired from the service in April, 1862, and died March 31, 1868. His widow survived him nearly three years, dying Feb. 10, 1871. Mrs. Brown was reared in London, and for several years was one of the well-known singers of the city, and a member of St. Peter's choir. As Miss Kitty Joell she will be best remembered by the older citizens, whose memories go back to the musical events of 40 years ago, when she took part in most of the local public concerts of that period.

On Nov. 26, 1872, Miss Joell was married in St. Peter's Cathedral to Richard C. Brown, a native of this city, and a son of John and Catherine (Irwin) Brown, natives of Ireland, who settled in London in 1847, where Mr. Brown was born the following year. In the spring of 1873 she removed with her husband to St. Louis, Mo., and lived in different States of the Union for 25 years. In April, 1898, Mr. Brown and family returned to London, where previously he had become financially interested in the boot and shoe business, and here she resided up to the date of her death.

Her husband and son, Richard Joell Brown, she is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. John Clarke, of London, and Mrs. David A. Smith, of Chicago.

Mrs. Brown was a kind, affectionate and charitable woman, and was loved most by those intimate friends who knew her best. A devoted wife, a fond mother, and a steadfast friend, the golden links of affection and love of home and family were the main springs of her daily life. Possessing wonderful determination and tenacity of purpose, she bore her long and painful illness with Christian patience, and seldom spoke of her great sufferings. A sincere and faithful Catholic, she remained firm and practical in her faith up to the close of her life, and died strengthened and soled by the last sacraments of the church. Her death is an irreparable loss to her family and friends, for throughout her life she was always

This rally will consist of:

A business meeting at the college at 11 a.m. The officers for the ensuing year will be elected, and the policy to be followed by the association during the coming year be determined.

A meeting at 3 p.m. in the Auditorium at which Dr. Frank Billings of Chicago will deliver an address on "The Medical Profession in America." He is one of that small group of men given to each generation, whose inspiration lies behind the progress of scientific medicine, and his original contributions in the field of internal medicine has been among the most important works of the present generation.

The social side of the rally will take the form of a banquet at the Tecumseh House at 8 o'clock Friday evening. Several prominent speakers will be present and an enjoyable social time is assured.

The graduates now numbering over 400 are ever given in this progressive district, speaking world, and not a few have been following their chosen calling in such distant lands as China, India and Africa. Every graduate of the college in those remote countries, have been invited, and many from a distance have expressed their intention of being in London on Friday.

All members of the profession are invited to the meeting as the association feel that the medical men of Western Ontario will be anxious to hear so eminent a man as Dr. Billings.
