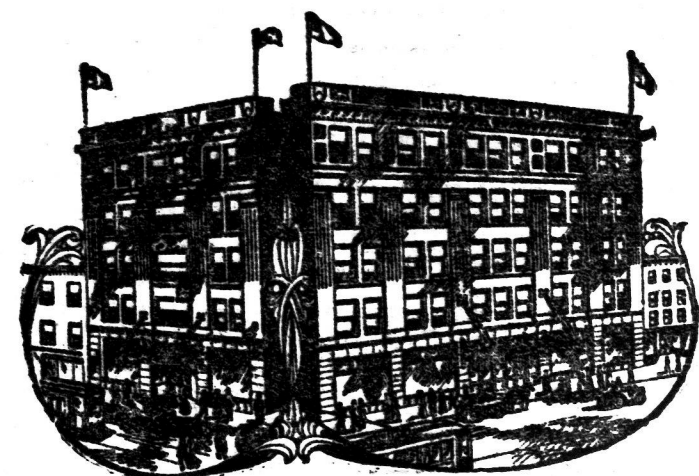

BAD KINGSTON FIRE.

Kingston, Nov. 18.—Fire of incendiary origin wiped out the stores of George Monks and barn and carriage storehouse of W. Detlow. The loss is put at \$17,000, with \$8,000 insurance. Mr. Monks, who was in the store when the roof fell in, had a narrow escape.

New York, Nov. 18.—Edgar Oscar Silver, founder and president of the house of Silver, Burdett & Co., publishers of school and college textbooks, died at East Orange, N. J., today, in his 50th year.

A GREATER NUMBER IN CANADA'S PRISONS

Increase of 14.6 Per Cent in the Last Fiscal Year—British Columbia Leading.

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—Statistics of the penitentiaries of the Dominion for the year ended March 31, 1909, are included in the blue book of the department of justice, just issued. The inspector's report on average daily penitentiary "population" during the year shows an increase of 14.6 per cent over the preceding year.

The British Columbia Penitentiary shows the greatest increase, 34 per cent. St. Vincent de Paul comes next with an increase of 27 per cent, and Manitoba third, with 20 per cent. The increase in Kingston was about 17 per cent. It is noted that a larger proportion of convicts is reported from the urban than from the rural districts. In this connection the inspector observes:

"Montreal contributes 77 per cent to the population of St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary. Winnipeg 80 per cent to that of Manitoba, and Vancouver alone has sent in 40 per cent of the convicts at New Westminster. There is no perceptible increase of criminality in the rural districts."

At the close of the year there were 570 convicts in Kingston, 510 in St. Vincent de Paul, 240 in Dorchester, 144 in Manitoba, 204 in British Columbia, and 91 in Alberta, a total of 1,765. Of these 1,046 were Canadian-born, 199 English, 34 Scotch, 54 Irish, and 24 of other British origin. Of 409 convicts of foreign birth, 181 were United States citizens, and 71 Italians. There are 66 life convicts in the penitentiaries, half of whom are in Kingston. Ten per cent of the convicts are under 20 years of age, 15 per cent are unable to read or write; 17 per cent have been total abstainers, and 40 per cent have been intemperate.

The inspector assorts the convicts by creed as follows: Roman Catholics, 871; Church of England, 343; Methodists, 185; Presbyterians, 173; Baptists, 78; Lutheran, 41; other Christian denominations, 12; Hebrews, 15; Buddhists, 17; Mormon, 1; Unitarian, 1; no creed, 28.

The average daily cost to the country for each convict was 76 cents, or \$277.35 a year, compared with 92 cents, or \$338.74 a year in 1907-8. Alberta leads in per capita cost, with an average of \$539 for 1908-9. The cost in British Columbia was \$432; in Manitoba, \$425; in Dorchester, \$310; in St. Vincent de Paul, \$248, and in Kingston, \$221.

Inspector's Recommendations.

The chief recommendations of the inspectors are the adoption of the system of indeterminate sentences and employment of prison labor in the production of articles required by the various departments of Government. They commend the parole system, but recommend that the supervision of the Dominion parole officer should be restricted to those released from the penitentiaries, if the best results are to be obtained.

The report of the parole officer, Mr. W. P. Archibald, shows that 244 prisoners were released on parole during the year from the penitentiaries, and

244 from jails and prisons; total 488. Nineteen paroles were forfeited by subsequent convictions. He reports that the juvenile courts, where established, are producing excellent results.

RUSSIA IS READY TO OCCUPY PERSIA

Likely to Send Troops Into Province to Protect Traders.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 18.—Russia is preparing to witness the second round of the duel between Ivolosky and Aehrenthal. The former scarcely had announced his Raccoungi interviews with the Italian statesmen and succeeded in establishing the identity of the policy of Russia and Italy in the Balkans and elsewhere around Turkish territory before the crisis in Turkey's neighbors, Persia and Greece, suddenly was brought to a head.

It is north Persia's relapse into chaos that chiefly concerns Russia, and her frontier officials have been obliged to pretend to co-operate with Sattar Kahn, as governor of Persia's northwest province, Adgerbajan, which adjoins the Turkish boundary and is populated largely with Turkish Kurds.

The Russian foreign office described Sattar as a brigand until it had to recognize him as an executive officer under the new regime at Teheran. His overthrow by rival chieftains who nominally are champions of the ex-shah leaves Adgerbajan, where several Russian traders have permanent abodes, in such a position that Russian military occupation of its northern districts during the winter seems assured.

The Teheran authorities say they cannot send an adequate force to protect the outlying towns because they have no money. Moreover, the new regime is committed to the principle of not raising loans without the consent of Parliament, which meets the end of next week. Already more than half the members are detained in regions remote from the capital by tribesmen who are not so much against the new regime as against any control from Teheran.

The deadlock is completed by Russia's promise to England not to loan money to Persia except under the latter's constitutional guarantee. In any case Russian public opinion will insist on the protection of the Russian colony in Northern Persia, even at the risk of Turkey protesting the menace of Russian occupation of Adgerbajan.

It is realized that Austro-German influence in Constantinople will be used to make Russia's position more difficult. St. Petersburg society is witnessing a manifestation of personal bitterness between Aehrenthal and Ivolosky. The latter, unlike a majority of the leading men of Russia, has a decided leaning to highly titled people. To gratify this weakness, Aehrenthal made a practice of filling the Austrian embassy with princes, serene highnesses, and Hungarian magnates of the first degree, who dutifully attended all Ivolosky's social receptions. Since Ivolosky's quarrel with Aehrenthal over the latter's coup in the Balkans, the Austrian embassy steadily has been denuded of aristocrats, who have been replaced by untitled functionaries from the routine branches of the Austrian consular service.

FRENCH SCHOOL WAR

Vatican Believes France Would Do Away With Christianity.

Rome, Nov. 18.—Pope Pius, in an address to the French pilgrims, whom he received today, declared that France was making war against the church with an aim of undermining the basis of Christianity.

The Pontiff said that Catholicism was suffering persecution by the French Government under the pretext of the separation of the state and church. All this, said the Pope, instead of defending their religious rights, and he concluded his address by urging the faithful to cling to the episcopacy.

France of Tomorrow.

It is asserted that the Vatican is ready to fight on the two questions, the denial of legal acknowledgment of the Catholic hierarchy and scholastic instruction. Mothers of the Catholic pupils at the young girls' school at Chassigny-Saint-Dun, in Saone-et-Loire, today made the public bonfire of the interdicted textbooks used by their own daughters. At other places in that community, Catholic girls withdrew from the schools.

At Bayonne where the priests have refused absolution to the children attending the public schools in defiance of the church's warning, the parents have retaliated by refusing to contribute to the support of the church.
