Seven paces from the north door a man's dark Christy hat lay on the ground. hat lay northeast from the door, and just east of the hat, two and a half feet away, he found a lady's hair comb.

Traced the Footmarks.

There were footmarks on the ground around a window at the south side. Witness traced them through a gate and around some lumber, to a fence adjoining the brick wall. Prodger was arrested on the next day and his boots taken over and placed in the tracks. They were found to correspond exactly.

Cross-examined. Detective Down asked regarding the nature of the ground, said it was soft and most favcrable for obtaining impressions. He had covered the marks he wished to examine so that they would not be changed. Witness covered one track particularly, as it was a good one, using an old stable door which kept the rain from erasing the marks.
