PITTSBURG PURCHASES O'TOOLE'S MATE, KELLY

Dreyfus Paid \$7,500 in Cash, and Turned Over \$2,500 Worth of Players.

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, Ill., July 28.—This statement is printed here today that President Barney Dreyfus, of the Pittsburgh Nationals, has purchased Catcher William Kelly, battery mate of Pitcher Martin O'Toole, of the St. Paul American Association team, who was sold to Pittsburgh a few days ago for \$25,000 and another pitcher, Dreyfus, it is said, paid \$7,500 in cash for Kelly, and will give St. Paul a catcher worth \$2,500. Kelly will report to the Pittsburgh Club at the same time as O'Toole, which will be some time in September.
