AGAIN AT OTTAWA**

The Ice Was Not So Fast, Owing to
Mild Weather, and Visitors Were
at Their Best.

Ottawa, Jan. 18.—The visiting Scottish
curlers were winners again today, de-
feating the Gables by 21 shots in an ex-
citing six-rink match. Play was very
close, one of the rinks even up, another
being won by a solitary shot, and a third
by two. The weather was milder, and
the Scotsmen consequently were dead-
at their best. In the afternoon the Scot-
sman played the Ottawa Valley clubs,
and this evening they were tendered a
farewell banquet at the House of Com-
mons restaurant. They leave in the
morning for Kingston, thence going to
Toronto. Messrs. McEwen and Car-
leton, of Toronto, representing the
Western Ontario branch of the Royal
Caledonian Society, came to Ottawa this
morning, and will take charge of the
visitors when they entrain tomorrow.

notice the coal cars, which were being
shunted across the avenue. An insur-
ance man, Robert Gallagher, saw the
milkman's danger and shouted at him
from the sidewalk. The vendor suddenly
jerked his horse just as the car struck
the animal's head, knocking it around
in its tracks. The horse was not seri-
ously hurt, but the driver was badly
frightened.

**HATCHET BURIED
BY COMMISSION**

Trouble Over Mr. Glaubitz's
Powers Is Finally
Settled.

SORT OF COMPROMISE

Engineer Must Submit All Important
Matters to the Chairman or the
Whole Water Board.

The dispute between the water com-
missioners and General Superintendent
Glaubitz as to the powers of the latter
was amicably settled Thursday afternoon
at the regular meeting of the board. It
was in the nature of a compromise, and
virtually maintains the right of the
board to veto any action of the general
manager, as he is now styled. There
was little discussion, and when Com-
missioner Chapman moved his resolution
that the general manager refer all mat-
ters of importance to the board or the
chairman before final action is taken on
any important question, all voted in
favor of it with the exception of Com-
missioner Stevenson.

The session was marked with a few
rather pointed passages at arms. Com-
missioner Stevenson filing his objections to
the pre-arranged programme. He and
Mayor Graham said a few things.

After same routine business had been
disposed of, Chairman Pocock asked
Superintendent Glaubitz if he had any-
thing to submit to the board.

The Discussion.

"Yes, the submission again of the plan
for the reorganization of the water de-
partment," answered Mr. Glaubitz. "As
was explained to the commissioners at
the last meeting, this is practically the
same plan as was in operation last year.
Some slight changes have been made,
such as changing the name of the com-
mission to that of utilities commission,
changing the name of the general super-
intendent to that of general manager,
and placing the meter and turn cock
men under the control of the water-
works foreman."

Commissioner Chapman stated that he
wished to introduce a motion.

"I wish to move a resolution as fol-
lows: That the general manager refer
all matters of importance to the board
or chairman for consideration before
final action is taken," he declared. "I
have no desire, whatever, to impair the
efficiency of the department. I am
hoping for the best results. It often
happens that matters of importance
are brought before the board, and as it
is necessary that they be settled at once,
I have provided that Mr. Glaubitz con-
sult with the chairman before final ac-
tion is taken."

"There was no intention when this plan
was adopted to interfere with any man
in the employ of the departments," ex-
plained Chairman Pocock.

"There must be central authority, and
that is what we have been seeking to
obtain. We are jealous of our reputa-
tion as businessmen, and we want to
put the same business ability into the
city's business as we do into our own."

Chairman Pocock declared Commissioner
Chapman if he intended moving a mo-
tion to adopt the scheme as introduced
declared that he did not.

"I will move the same motion I did
at the last meeting," declared Mayor
Graham. "The question of defining Mr.
Glaubitz's powers would have been con-
sidered later and settled."

"Unfortunately it was not so under-
stood," answered Commissioner Chap-
man.

"I will not support the scheme for re-
organization, and want to go down on
record as such," declared Commissioner
Stevenson.

The motion was put and carried. Com-
missioner Stevenson only voting against
it.

The motion of Commissioner Chapman
was then put, and started something.

"Let it go through," commented Com-
missioner Stevenson. "It has all been
pre-arranged."

"I take exception to the statement
that was pre-arranged," retorted
Mayor Graham. "I do not think any
member of this board has any right to
talk like that. There is no need to deal
in personalities; let us get down to
business."

The motion carried. Chairman Pocock
declared that the resolution was the suc-
cess of the department last year being a sat-
isfactory guarantee that the water com-
missioners would look after the interests of
the city.

"The board will make no mistake in
allowing this man to direct its policy,"
commented the chairman.

"What is the use of discussing it any
more?" said Commissioner Stevenson.
"This thing was all pre-arranged at
some meetings."

"I attended no meetings, and do not
know that there were any meetings,"
declared Mayor Graham.

"There is this difficulty in handling
city business," said Chairman Pocock.
"If, for instance, a man is dismissed,
his little faults are sometimes com-
mented on, and we cause him unnecessary
humiliation when it gets in the papers."

"You should expect to be criticized,"
said Commissioner Stevenson.

"There have been meetings among
the members," explained Commissioner
Chapman. "The resolution is not the
result of one of these conferences."

"However, the members continued to
discuss the matter, until Chairman Po-
cock asked for another item of busi-
ness."

The Concludes.

Commissioner Stevenson asked about
the meeting in Toronto relative to con-
dults, and taxed Chairman Pocock with
another motion made by himself
last November to have the various
