Merger Report.

Considerable credence is being given the rumor in marine circles that a new shipping or vessel combine is being formed to control practically the entire lake trade. Japanese Protest Not Yet Delivered

Washington, D. C., May 8.—Secretary of State Bryan's first move upon his return today from the west was to confer with President Wilson, to make a first-hand report of the anti-alien land situation as he found it in California. The Japanese embassy has been withholding its formal diplomatic protest on the Webb bill for the secretary's return, and it is now believed to be that Government's plan to withhold it still longer until inquiry can be made of the United States as to just what the American Government proposes to do if Governor Johnson signs the bill, and it becomes a law. Under such a plan of action, the protest probably will not be delivered today.

The presentation of the protest will open the formal diplomatic negotiations, which may lead to a test in the supreme court of whether such a law is in contravention of the treaty with Japan. The negotiations also may lead to a proposal of arbitration at The Hague tribunal or a determination of the anthropological status of the Japanese race to settle whether they are eligible to citizenship in the United States.

CHARGE DISMISSED

Suit For \$3,000 Was Brought Against Magistrate of Hamilton.

Toronto, May 8.—There is no pretence that what I did was in any way within the scope of his official duties," declares Master-in-Chambers Cartwright, in dismissing on all grounds the motion by Magistrate Jelfs, of Hamilton, for an order for security for costs in the action brought against him by Frederick Fritz. The suit is for \$3,000 damages for alleged wrongfully eviction from a Florence street house in Hamilton.

The decision is without prejudice to a judge of the high court for an order dismissing the action on the ground that it is frivolous.
