

OMAHA GOES WILD OVER MR. WILSON; PRO-HUNS "KNOCK"

Enthusiastic Reception For
President at Western
City.

TRUTH SOCIETY IS ACTIVE

The Teuto-Celt Organization
Launches Campaign To
Defeat Wilson.

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 6.—President Wilson discussed the European war, peace, and American business in three speeches here yesterday afternoon and evening.

He was everywhere received with enthusiastic cheers. He declared America is as ready to fight as any nation in the world, but that its cause must be just. After the war, he said, this nation must join a league of nations to preserve the peace of the world.

Seldom before has the president received such an outburst of cheering as greeted him from the thousands of people packing the Omaha auditorium last night. The applause was sharp and ear-splitting. He rose several times and bowed, smiling broadly. Calls of "Three cheers for our next president" were cheered.

A great crowd packed the streets outside. For several minutes there were such calls as "Who kept us out of war—Wilson?" "Who prevented the strike—Wilson?" "Who saved the nation—Wilson?"

TO FIGHT WILSON.

New York, Oct. 6.—A meeting of the so-called American Truth Society, an organization formed for the purpose of advancing the German propaganda, was held here last night for the purpose of forming a campaign committee of 5,000 to wage a campaign for the defeat of President Wilson and all candidates opposed by the society. Bernard Rider, editor of the New York Staats Zeitung, who was the chairman, reviewed the "Teuto-Celt victories" of the past year in the United States, in which, he said, the Teuto-Celt, who represents the real Americanism, went out and beat the pseudo-Americanism represented by Woodrow Wilson. He mentioned among these the victory of Senator Martin of New Jersey in the recent Democratic primary.

O'Leary Enters Suit.
Prior to the meeting, announcement was made that Jeremiah A. O'Leary, a prime mover in the "Truth Society," has entered suit against Vice McCormick, chairman of the Democratic national committee, for alleged slander, growing out of an exchange of telegrams between O'Leary and President Wilson on October 3. O'Leary said he resented a statement attributed to Mr. McCormick criticizing him for sending an "insulting message" to President Wilson. In that message Mr. O'Leary criticized the president for "not enforcing American rights against Great Britain" and informed Mr. Wilson that he would not vote for the re-election of the president. Mr. Wilson replied that he would "feel deeply mortified to have you (Mr. O'Leary) or anybody like you vote for me," adding: "Since you have access to many disloyal Americans, and I have not, I will ask you to convey this message to them."

HEAVY FIRE LOSS IN COLD STORAGE PLANT

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Fire this morning gutted the cold storage and egg plant of Flavell's Limited, on King street. The buildings were filled with produce almost to capacity and shipment for the European market had been delayed only pending the arrival of the output from the Canadian agencies of the firm. It is said that the warehouse contained more than \$250,000 worth of produce. The plant was valued at \$50,000. An explosion occurred in the ammonia plant during the progress of the fire. No estimate of the damage caused by the fire has yet been made.

2,000 CANADIANS WANTED FOR NAVY ON NEW BATTLESHIPS

Vessels About To Be Released
From the Stocks, Says
Capt. Guinness.

TORONTO, Oct. 5.—"Great Britain would like Canada to contribute 2,000 men to the imperial navy before the end of the war," declared Capt. Hon. Rupert Guinness, M.P., today, at the luncheon of the Empire Club. "Experience has taught the British admiralty that a landsman can be made very efficient and useful on a battleship. These men are required for the battleships which are about to be released from the stocks." Volunteers from Canada will be enlisted as part of the royal Canadian volunteer reserves, to form an overseas division, and almost immediately upon enrollment will be sent to England for training and service with the fighting fleets of the Empire. In the North Sea and elsewhere, as required. In compliance with a request of the Dominion Government the British admiralty will place the recruits from Canada on equal footing as regards pay, pensions and allowance with their fellow-citizens in the Canadian expeditionary forces.

NINE MEN, TWO PRIESTS, DIE IN COLLEGE FIRE

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 5.—Nine men are known to have perished as the result of a fire that destroyed the main building of the Christian Brothers' College here today. Two of the dead are known priests who were trapped on the fifth floor by the flames. Five of the known dead were firemen, who were carried to the basement from the third floor when a wall collapsed. Seven firemen were taken out alive, badly hurt.

One hundred and five students and thirty members of the faculty were at breakfast when the fire broke out, and left the building in orderly fashion.

BERLIN FOOD PRICES.

Berlin, Via London, Oct. 6.—Maximum prices for spoiled butter and other fats are planned in the near future. This is the result of the discovery that large amounts of fats fit for human consumption have spoiled or been allowed to spoil, and then sold at prices far exceeding those set for unsold fats. The food dictatorship department is making an investigation to discover whether the increase in spoiled fats has been the result of carelessness or intention.

GIRL WAS LEADER OF MOTOR BANDITS AT HAMMONDON, N.J.

Led Band of Foreigners Who
Slew Prominent Merchant.

SIX ARE UNDER ARREST

19-Year-Old Millie de Marco
Believed To Have Planned
Hold-Up.

Philadelphia, Oct. 6.—With four persons under arrest in this city and two in Camden, N. J., and the police dragging closing about four others who are now under surveillance in connection with a sensational holdup and murder at Hammondon, N. J., yesterday, the authorities here today declared their belief that Millie de Marco, 19 years old, of this city, one of the prisoners, and an employee of A. J. Rider, president of the New Jersey Cranberry Growers' Association, engineered the entire plot.

Led by a Girl.
The De Marco girl and three Italians arrested in this city last night, were traced to the Italian colony here through the license number of an automobile, in which eleven men and one woman were seen in the vicinity of the home of the Riders yesterday, shortly before the murder of Henry Rider of Howell, Mich., and the shooting of his brother and two others, Rider and his daughter, Mrs. Elsie Smithers, who voluntarily drove the automobile after she had been wounded, and Jas. N. Rieby, who also occupied a seat in the Rider car at the time of the attack, are in the Jefferson Hospital, this city. Their condition today was hopeful, and physicians say they will recover. Some of the men under arrest was in Rider's employ as far as the police were able to learn by a hurried investigation.

Traced by Auto.

The sight of eleven men and a lone girl in an automobile aroused unusual interest among the natives of Atsion, N. J. Someone casually noted that the automobile bore a Pennsylvania license number. Detectives learned the number of the car and the description of the girl, which corresponded with that of the young woman Rider employed on his cranberry bogs.

The girl knew the movements of Mr. Rider on pay days and was aware of the large amount of money required for the payroll of about 300 men and women cranberry pickers. The police are working on the theory that she planned the shooting with the aid of confederates from this city. All have admitted, the police say, that they were at Atsion yesterday.

CANCEL THEIR SAILINGS ACROSS THE NORTH SEA

London, Oct. 6.—Owing to the risks of North Sea traffic, the Batavier Line has suspended its regular sailings between London and Rotterdam. The Batavier Line operated a fleet of eleven steamers, ranging in tonnage from 1,000 to 6,000 tons. Several Dutch steamers have recently been sunk by submarines in the North Sea.

OTTAWA FINANCIER DEAD.

OTTAWA, Oct. 5.—Redmond Q. Lin, a director of the Ottawa Electric Railway, and Ottawa Car Company, died here suddenly this afternoon. He was in his 57th year.

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 5.—Patrolman Wilson, of the traffic squad, who has been on duty at the Billy Sunday tabernacle since the opening of the campaign, "hit the trail" with about twenty-five others at the close of the services this afternoon.

The policeman's appearance in uniform, the third of the trail-hitters to respond, brought an outburst of applause from the platform.

DETECTIVES UNEARTH ASSASSINATION PLOT AGAINST MR. SHONTS

Two Men Charged With Conspiracy To Murder Street Railway Heads.

New York, Oct. 6.—Conspiracy to assassinate Theodore P. Shonts and Frank Hedley, president and general manager, respectively, of the Interboro Rapid Transit and the New York Railways companies, was unearthed here last night, according to the police. Two men have been detained, and detectives are said to be searching the city for others alleged to be involved.

The police declare a conversation in a saloon which was overheard by a disinterested person led to the discovery of the alleged plot against the two largest transit companies affected by the strike of unionized carmen.

The prisoners, who gave their names as Oscar Wallace and John J. Spearan, were questioned for several hours today, but the police said that to reveal the result of this examination might hamper in continuing the investigation.

SHACKLETON AT BUENOS AYRES.
